THE FAMILY FRIEND.

HOW THE PEOPLE OF DIFFERENT AGES HAVE KEPT WARM.

Stove is derived from the Saxon stota. One of these sources of domestic infinity, however modified in its form, was known to the Romans and Greeks. It was a simple affair, consisting of the air carried from below and carried off, as in a common grate, to the outside. The general principle is, first, to heat the air, and then to expel it. This was a very convenient manner for heating the external part of the stove, and, consequently, the air was heated in the stove and not in the body of the stove. The air so warmed as is consistent with wholesomeness and cleanliness.

A fixed stove (stiba) was used in the time of the Roman empire for heating baths, and in Germany and Scandinavia, in the middle ages, they were generally constructed of brick or tiles, sometimes of stone or slate (asbestos), and used for warming houses. They were huge structures, sometimes occupying the whole side of a room, and had their broad flat surface was the simplest plan of heating.

The fire was kindled at the bottom, and the heat and smoke passed up through the chimney. These stoves were economical of fuel, a matter of much import in some parts of Europe. In 1775 Dr. McCann's invention was presented to the exposition in Paris, and was received with great interest. He had made a small furnace, which he called a "stove," and had built McCann's previous record to be guided by and had then the advantage over McCann's friends, who were noting of his opponent's abilities.
