A special will carry the order to the lake, and after that hourly trains will bring the afternoon crowd. A large list of prizes is prepared for the occasion, including awards for the biggest, bowling record, winners of a baseball game, winners of a tug of war contest, eagle with largest family, and for winners of running events.

The Latter-day Saints' university has just issued a business college circular of unusual attractiveness. It contains a summary of the work of the commercial school, which comprises the Salt Lake and the Latter-day Saints' college combined in one institution.
