ENGINEERS' ESTIMATES.

City Improvements Now Under Contract Will Reach Nearly \$750,000.

In a report submitted to the council last night, Engineer Keisey places the improvements of the municipality now under contract at \$742,149.48, of which sum the city's portion is \$213,751.29, while property owners will pay \$528,-398.09.
