Now the most approved signal code calls for red for danger; yellow, or preferably orange, for caution, and green for safety. W. E. Chamberlain, formerly a general manager for the New York, New Haven and Hartford road, was the originator of this code, and it is said to have been suggested by an in-teresting fact. At a certain point on that road a house was located at such an angle to the railroad track that the light from one window used to strike the engineer's line of vision at the same time that he was expected to distin-guish the light of the block signal he was approaching. Several times the white light from the house was mis-taken for the "clear" signal and dis-aster narrowly was averted. This pos-sibility soon became known to all en-glneers and all accordingly slowed their trains on approaching this "block" un-til they became certain of their ground. ### Movement on Foot to Increase Pay of Uncle Sam's Enlisted Men.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 21 .- A move is being made for an increase in the pay of United States troops and

sailors. U. S. Senator Dick is pushing the proposition; he has been a close student of the army for many years, and is convinced that it is absolutely necessary to grant an increase of pay, especially for the enlisted men, if the army is to be maintained at anything like its present standard. As an ex-ample of the impossibility of getting recruits or re-enlistments at the pres-est rate of pay, he says that a few weeks ago he saw a company of in-fantry on a practise march. There were only six enlisted men present with the company. The senator be-lieves Congress and the people would not sanction the continuance of laws that made such a condition possible.
