

BRANSFORD WINS IN AN EASY WALK

Lippman Fails to Weather Storm—McMillan is Snowed Under.

COUNCILMEN BUMPED HARD.

Martin, Black and Reedall Trimmed to a Nicety—Muley, O'Donnell, Quinn, Reed and McKinney.

The above table indicates to what extent the trick to get Mayor Bransford out of the race succeeded. His supporters are jubilant today over the result of the primaries last evening and are confidently predicting that he will come down the home stretch leading the field by many lengths and win in a walk.

The other candidates claim greater strength than is indicated by the above table. There were combinations of all sorts, some of the Lippman-McMillan ticket and some of Bransford-McMillan ticket. There was a strong desire to elect Lippman.

In the fourth the Bransford forces lost in the Lippman contingent a driving force. They will not soon forget, especially in view of the fact that it is Lippman's going district. A vote of 100 to 1 about tells the story.

In the fight for the council, that stalwart veteran L. D. Martin was defeated. He has no chance of getting into the council again. Judge J. W. McKinnon and John B. Moreton are the probable candidates. From the second ward, that Martin E. Muley will carry the nomination from the city is practically a certainty. With this will be R. M. Quinn as T. B. Black and Mrs. Booth will be turned down.
