

Romantic Story of a Long Journey

THE experiences of Mr. Alexander Hoad, British consul-general at Chengtu, central China, during his recent journey from that place through western China to the frontier of Tibet and back, form the subject of a Thibet office report issued yesterday, and make an exceptionally interesting narrative.

His travels, going and returning, lasted over three months, and he covered 600 miles in each direction. They are illustrated by a map.

Mr. Hoad set out on July 28. "There was an enormous traffic on the road," he writes, "especially as far as Shuang-liu. Wheelbarrows laden with passengers, many of them asleep in spite of the jolting, trundled along. Huge bags of rice and black pigs were being similarly conveyed, the latter strapped in pairs on their backs, joining their equals to the squeaking of the wheels. Nearly all the inhabitants of the mountainous country passed during the first fortnight—men, women and children—wearing turbans, white or blue, and many of them undressed, in an or goat-skin coats. The women, as

"Level, dark-brown eyes, finely-cut features, an excellent carriage, and sprightliness of manner distinguish them from the timid and insipid Chinese. The Thibetan woman is not afraid or ashamed to give vent to her feelings in peals of merry laughter."

Among the Thibetans Mr. Hoad states it is rare to meet an undernourished man. They are tall, lithe, and very. Their magnificent climate, outdoor life, and abundance of exercise make men of them. Female infanticide is unheard of, and women are a very valuable asset. She is the life, the mainstay, of the Thibetan family.—London Express.

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THE TEMPERANCE CAUSE.

The matter in this column is edited and prepared by ladies of Ogden interested in temperance work.

ANOTHER governor entitled to rank with Fulk in courage and upright conviction is Hanly of Indiana, whose communication recently appeared in The Ram's Horn. He has been compelled to remove a fellow named Krueger from office because the latter refused to execute the laws regulating the saloon traffic in Michigan City. His excuse was that "the thought" the citizens should be allowed to decide how police matters should be conducted, law or no law, and referred to "privileges" they had enjoyed under previous administrations. Governor Hanly took occasion to say a few things that should get under the hide of the most thick-skinned man who ever assumed a public duty and shamelessly failed to perform it. Krueger was informed that "under the present administration there are no 'privileges,'" and then he was joined by the forceful reminder that "no executive officer has

a right to do any thinking" as to the propriety or wisdom of existing laws. This is the chief point in Governor Hanly's sharp reprimand. Krueger's offense lay chiefly in his "thinking." He "thought" Michigan City should not be amenable to the laws of the state if he "thought" the people wanted something else, if he "thought" that "business interests" would suffer through strict enforcement of the laws. Krueger, on his own admission, was first of all a dry goods merchant. A "side-open" policy made him totally unfit for the office of police commissioner. Governor Hanly asks of all the executive officers of the state that the laws be impartially and faithfully executed. He asks that the "business interests" never do require a "side-open" town, but, on the contrary, that such license does both material and moral damage to any community.

The people have a true heart, and it is always true to a man of courage and conviction, even though his soul may go counter to their interests and convictions. How magnificently this where the governor is executing the laws fearlessly against what was thought to be popular opinion! In St. Louis Governor Folk closed the Sunday saloons in the face of a loud demand that he keep hands off. He obeyed the law and his sacred oath to obey it, and enforced obedience on the part of all. Do they turn and try to rend him? They are determined, rather to make him president. A prominent man on his

return from a trip through the west said: "The most remarkable thing I have come across in my western trip is the extraordinary success of Governor Folk in enforcing the laws in Missouri. It is most encouraging to note the state are giving in to the people of the state. The population is largely German, probably as much as in either Chicago or Milwaukee—the saloons are closed tight on Sunday, and the city appears to like this condition of things. According to last condition, crime has decreased 10 per cent, and Governor Folk issued his Sunday lawing mandate."

There in Missouri was a signal to states of the power of public opinion and of the ability of a strong, upright official to make it serve its highest end.
