

of having no employment for our boys, not even when they have learned trades, is beginning to be felt in our midst, and unless the suggestions of "Uriel" are carried out we are preparing ourselves for a state of wholesale pauperism, and it is little use denying it. Our boys are wanted to learn trades, but as one of the boys I would ask what encouragement is offered them for learning anything while we never patronize their workmanship when they have become competent workmen? Many of our boys, after learning a good useful trade, are thrown out of employment and have to seek other means of livelihood than that to which they were brought up, to the neglect of their trade, and not having the required practice for competency, are not and never will be master mechanics, hence the depreciation which is at once shown on all classes of our home manufactured goods. But I know that the most of this depreciation is owing to the prejudice and narrow-mindedness of the people, their pride and bigotry, and not on account of the inferiority of the goods, for if our own mechanics, young and old, have not the practice through lack of encouragement to enable them to do very fine work, yet they have the honor to do their work well, which cannot be said of very much of the made-up goods from the East. Our home manufactures ought to be encouraged by every means possible, then it would not be difficult to start the United Order, if we all were willing to support and sustain one another by our means and influence. If we were willing to do this, it would be no question with us, what shall we do with our boys? Give our boys something to do, and they will look after themselves.

The co-operative stores should be the fostering mothers of all branches of home industry; that was their mission partly when they were first organized, but I am sorry to see that this part of their work is not half done. People often ask for home-made goods and cannot get them. Our merchants are continually sending East for goods which can just as well be made here. What then should be done? Let our merchants obtain a quantity of every article of home manufacture that is thrown upon the market, and place them side by side with the same class of eastern manufactured goods, and let the people choose for themselves and especially let us have home-made-up clothing and wearing apparel generally.

As a people, we expect some day to have to do without foreign-made goods. Unless our boys are taught some useful branch of industry, when this time comes we shall have to do without many comforts and luxuries that we now enjoy; then we shall see the folly of our present course. Why can we not see it now, and prepare for coming events?

We have been taught by the servants of the Almighty that we did wrong in supporting outside merchants and mechanics in our midst, when we could patronize our brethren and those who had our welfare at heart. I would then ask, how much less grievous is it that we should now go abroad and support those who have not the least interest with us, and neglect our native talent? Those who do this must be blind to their own welfare, and it is high time they reformed in this matter.

I wish now to offer another plea for our boys. They are often spoken of by the unthinking as rebellious, ungovernable, and tending fast to infidelity and apostasy, and are, I might say, abused, both privately and publicly, that they may be driven into a proper standard of excellence. I would say to those who talk to and about our boys in this manner, that our boys are not made to be driven, but are made of better stuff; they are firm and independent, but you enlist their good feelings, their respect and their reverence towards you by kindness, charity and forbearance, and you will never find a more willing young community in all the world to be led and directed in the paths of honor, and you will find that they are full of integrity in and zeal for the work of the Lord.


