THE BANKER'S ALMANAC AND REGISTER FOR 1875.

The first which provoked discussion the one appropriating fifteen thousands for the expenses of the Indian peace commissioners, who have been serving without pay, 144 to 75. All the other amendments were agreed to.

Garfield from the conference committee on the legislative appropriation bill, reported that the committee had agreed to amend the bill, the point being on the item in regard to the pay of certain members of the House. The House moved that the House recede from its action, but after debate the motion was rejected and a new conference was ordered.

The House then went into a committee of the whole on the sundry civil appropriation bill, the pending question being on Butler's (Mass.) amendment appropriating \$5,000 for the expenses of the suit in the McCarthan case, which after a sharp debate, was adopted.

The committee then rose, and eulogies on the late Senator Brooks were delivered by several members, and the House took a recess (at 7:30) in the evening, a session to be for the consideration of the appropriation bill.

The Sundry Civil Appropriation Bill.

The House went into a committee of the whole on the sundry civil appropriation bill. A sharp debate occurred on the item for the support of the asylum in the District of Columbia, called the "Ward House," which had become infested and unsafe during their service, within three years after leaving the service. The amendment proposed that who have become insane since entering the service, and after a debate it was agreed to. A long and lively discussion occurred over the item appropriation for the purchase, construction and outfitting of heavy guns, and allowing the expenditure for the same to be paid by the Treasury.

A discussion also occurred over the item of \$200,000 for the purchase of arms and armor for the troops of the army, and after a debate it was agreed to.
