In the Supreme Court an opinion has
been delivered, reversing the decision of
the Circuit Court of Louisiana, reaffirm-
ing the legitimacy of Mrs. General
Gaines and confirming her in all the
rights of property.

Cincinnati.—At the election to-day
for judge of the supreme court, clerk of
the police court, city commissioners,
and one alderman from each ward, the
Democrats elected nearly the entire city
ticket. The Council will be Republi-
can by a small majority.

Dayton, Ohio.—The Republican city
ticket was elected by a majority of 50
to 300.

The city election yesterday gives a
Republican gain of about a thousand.
A large majority of the City Council is
Republican.

Sandusky, Ohio.—The entire Demo-
cratic ticket was elected yesterday by a
majority of about 200.

Chicago.—Michigan voted to-day on
the new Constitution, which embodied
negro suffrage. The returns clearly in-
dicate the defeat of the entire instru-
ment. Two articles, submitted separa-
tely, are being discussed; one on the
question of the prohibition of sales of
liquor, the other on annual or biennial
sessions of the legislature.

Mobile.—General Shepherd, comman-
ding the sub-district of Alabama, has
issued a very severe order for the sup-
pression of the Kluklux Klans.

It is said that the Bishops of the Irish
Church have united in a note to Disraeli
urging him to sacrifice half the reve-
nues of the Church establishment in or-
der to be able to save the rest.

Ottawa, 7.—At half-past two this
morning Darcy McGee was shot dead by
an unknown assassin who had just left
the parliament house and was entering
the door of his lodging; the ball passed
through McGee's head and lodged in the
door; his body was found on the pave-
ment soon after. Nobody was in the
neighborhood. The assassin is supposed
to be a Fenian.

Chicago, 7.—Harlan called up the bill
to amend the charter of the city of
Washington. Sumner offered an amend-
ment taking away the appointing pow-
er of the Mayor and giving it to the
common council, his reason being be-
cause the mayor was hostile to the
colored men. Several other amend-
ments were offered and variously dis-
posed of, and after considerable discus-
sion Sumner's amendment was adopted
and the bill finally passed. The naval
appropriation bill was next taken up,
and the debate on the proposed reduc-
tion of the navy was resumed. After a
long discussion, the amendment reduc-
ing the force, was rejected. The Senate
then went into executive session and
soon after adjourned.

Washington.—At the usual cabinet
meeting, to-day, Adj. Gen. Thomas
was present. The President sent several
nominations to the Senate to-day,
mostly military.

Gen. Grant has positively refused to
act in the matter of the removal of Gov.
Pierpont, and has telegraphed General
Schofield to carry the order appointing
Gov. Wells into effect. There is no
truth in the statement that Chief Jus-
tice Chase wrote the editorial in the
National Intelligencer against the con-
stitutionality of the present law in re-
gard to the Presidential succession.

New York, 8.—Butler's American
Theatre was burned last night. Cost of
building \$11,000, the actors lose all their
wardrobes.

Sandusky.—A fire last night burned
the lumber yard and ten or twelve small
dwelling houses; loss seventy-five thou-
sand dollars.

Judge Underwood has ordered Jeff.
Davis to appear at the May term of the
District Court at Richmond, when it is
asserted his trial will positively take
place. Chief Justice Chase will pre-
side.

Berlin.—The tide of emigration to
the United States has commenced with
increased volume; it is estimated that
7,000 Germans have left for the United
States within a week.

Washington 8.—Trumbull called up
the bill relating to the qualification of
jurors. The bill provides that the ex-
pression of an opinion founded on pub-
lic rumor or upon the statements in the
newspapers, should not disqualify a
man, otherwise competent.

Johnson supposed that the law already
allowed the court to use its discretion in
accepting such jurors.

Trumbull replied that it was so in
some states, but the object of this law
was to make the practice uniform.

After some debate by Bayard, Davis,
Frelinghuysen and others, the bill
passed, 37 to 8.
