To Liberate the Slaves.

LONDON, March 22.—A dispatch from Zanzibar says the conclusion of a treaty with prominent chiefs, by which the slave-trade should slavery in West Africa will be abolished in the present form. It is almost conceded that one will turn to Canada and Australia for arrangements similar to those made between Hawaii and the United States.

Friends and Foes.

CORINTH, March 22.—It is announced today that Parsons has written a letter to the Corse committee in which he accepts the task of studying itself and investigating the conduct of the British Legation in Honolulu before accepting Parsons' challenge, that they should both resign their seats in Parliament and come forward separately for reelection. Parsons has given up his seat in the House of Commons, but is continuing directly with Brady and with the latter's friends. Parsons adds it is impossible to secure any agreement to terms for his withdrawal, however, he has placed his application for the Chelmsford nomination. No such hands, however, have been found. Yesterday, Henry Adams himself headed before the members of the division of Cork which he represents.

Will not Recognize Either.

LONDON, March 22.—The Parliament of Ireland, the National League has voted not to lay any recognition of the survey from either of the factions existing in Ireland.

England and Newfoundland.

BOSTON, March 22.—The Herald's Halifax special says great excitement exists in Newfoundland over the action of the imperial government to recognize the independence of the "sovereign" provinces of France, to arbitration, and the acceptance of a plan through the British government to cover Newfoundland. Mr. Parsons says that no man has been made by men on both sides denouncing the "sovereignty" and "sovereignty" conduct of the British government. Delegates will be sent to London to demand that England be formally notified not only against the enactment of the measure, but also against the reference of the question to arbitration, without whose question to be referred. The delegates, however, do not expect any such action, and, in this event, the legislature will pass resolutions setting forth that by neglect and ill-treatment, England has inflicted a cruel blow to the fisheries. A resolution was passed with unanimous vote to the United States for protection and for admission as a State of the Republic.

LONDON PARAGRAPHS.

LONDON, March 22.—Lord Salisbury has written a letter to the Glasgow Chamber of Commerce, in which he speaks highly of the importance of the reciprocity treaty between Brazil and the United States.
