This was caused by the pressure going down. Many persons using fuel gas would go to bed at night and leave a gas lit lighted and turned low.

During the night pressure through the main would go down and the light at the jet would go out. Afterward the pressure would come up and again

gas would pour out through the open

lowed. Fuel gas is odorless and can-
not be detected, hence the greater

light. One beam from an ordinary
