LAW ON BUTTER WRAPPERS.

Attorney General Breeden Render Interpretation for Manufacturers.

In reply to a query from State Food and Dairy Commissioner Peterson, Atty.-Gen. Breeden handed down the following opinion yesterday afternoon, on butter wrappers:

"In reply to your inquiry of recent date you are advised that chapter 99, section 1, laws of 1997, relating to the 'Regulation, the manufacure, quality and sale of butter' was intended to apply only to the person, firm or com-pany manufacturing and offering and exposing packages of butter for sale to the public.
"This law, I think, was not intended

"This law, I think, was not intended to require each farmer or ranchman making a batch of butter to stamp his or her name upon the wrapper thereof before he or she could sell or offer the same to a creamery or other dealer. This would be impracticable. This section reads as follows:

"On each package of butter manufactured and offered or exposed for sale in the state of Utah, there shall be stamped upon the wrapper or package the name of the maker thereof with address of same and the actual number of ounces contained in sald wrapper or package at the time of its manufacture."

'All persons or companies dealing "All persons or companies dealing with the public and selling and exposing for sale any butter must have their name stamped upon the wrapper or package, with their address, and with the number of ounces contained in each package. This is required to be done as a means of identification so that in the event of the violation of the law in any respect mentioned in this act, the offender may be easily apprehended and brought to justice."

BISHOP SPALDING'S TALK.

Bishop F. S. Spalding will lecture to norrow evening in St. Paul's Episcopai. church on "The History of Socialism," being an account of the causes for the movement and the early leaders. The bishop spoke last evening in St. Mark's cathedral on the inspiration of the Bi-ble. In the course of his remarks he said: "Nowhere in the lives of men or in their literature found in the world since that time, have the revelations been found that characterized the writ-ings of those Hebrew writers. There are three things that mark the Old Testament as inspired; first, the reve-

lation of God, then of Him as a purpose, as wisdom and a Ruler in the airlairs of men, and finally of God as love, "He meets, redeems and saves." The birth of Jesus marked the New Testament. This advent came, not to complete the prophecies of the Old Testament, but to fill up and complete the great truth of justice, wisdom and love.
