All Defendants Remanded Without Bail-Chief Offender to be Deported.

El Paso, Tex., Nov. 12 .-- The cases of the alleged Mexican revolutionists under arrest here upon complaint of the Mexican government charging them with inciting a revolution, were taken up today by United States Commissioner Howe on preliminary trial. A surprise was sprung by the counsel for the Maxican government when the charge of murder was made also. The court was notified that application for extradition had been made upon the murder charge. The accused are Antonio Villareal, the alleged head of the St. Louis, Mo., junta, and Laero Aguirie and Ramon Cane, supposed to be associates by Villareal. All were remanded by the commissioner with-out bail pending the application. by the government of Mexico for extra-dition. The United States department of communerce and labor had introdition. The United States department of commerce and labor had just or-dered the d-portation of Villareai and he had sued for a writ of habeas cor-pus. Agurire is charaged with robbery and murder in Mexico in 1896 and Villareal with the murder in Coahuita two years ago.

TO DEPORT VILLAREAL.

TO DEPORT VILLAREAL. Washington, Nov. 12.—Antonio Vil-lareal, who is under arrest at El Paso, Texas is to be deported to Mexico, where he will face charges of treason brought against him by the Mexican government. After conferences be-tween officials of the state department, the department of justice and the department of commerce and labor, it was decided that Villareal should be sent back to his native country because of crimes committed by him before his immigration to the United States which made him an unfit person to which made him an unfit person to enter this country. Villareal was the leader of the Mexi-

can revolutionary movement in St. Louis which gave utterance to its doctrines through the newspaper

doctrines through the newspaper Regeneracion. Through the little group of revolu-tionists in St. Louis many predictions were made public that there would be

were made public that there would be a general uprising in Mexico and for-eigners in the southern republic were frequently alarmed by rumors of a movement in Mexico against persons not mative of that country. Villareal was originally arrested un-der a warrant holding him for extra-dition charged with being one of a large party of Mexicans alleged to have allegel to have broken into a public building in that country and have allegel to have broken lato a public building in that country and taken a quantity of arms and am-munition belonging to the republic. Attorneys for Villareal insisted that he and his associates who took the arms and ammunition were revolution.



This action will avoid legal tangles which might result from the attempt to decide whether the taking of arms and anemanition was really a criminal or political offense. The Mexican gov-ernment has also asked for the extra-dition of 61 other men who were asso-ciated with Villareal with the taking of munitions of war.

NO ONE RESPONSIBLE.

For Collapse of Hotel Bixby and Killing of Ten Men.

ing of Ten Men. Long Beach, Cal. Nov. 12.—The coroner's jury, investigating the cause of the collapse of the Hotel Bixby last Friday which resulted in the death of 10 men, and the injury of a score of athers, this afternoon re-turned a verdict finding that the acct-dent was caused by the premature re-moval of the supports of the fifth floor and the proceeding with the construc-lion of the roof before the support-ing cement had time to harden suffi-clently. The jury decided that no indi-vidual was criminally responsible.

SCHIFF'S SUCCESSOR NAMED.

They succeeded Jacob H. Schiff and James Stillman, who resigned several months ago. The other members of the board were re-elected.

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 13.—A com-et, which could be seen through a small telescope, was discovered Sat-urday night by Holger Thiel at Co-penhagen, according to a dispatch re-ceived today at the Harvard college observatory from Prof. Kreuntz of Kiel, Germany

(eastern standard time), in right ascension 9 hours, 15 minutes, 21.3 seconds, declination plus 12 degrees, 16 minutes 50 sec-onds; the second at 11:13:09 p. m., in right ascension 9 hours 16 minutes, 2.3 second: declination plus 12 de-3.3 second; declination plus 13 de-grees, 28 minutes 31 seconds.

ARMED BANDITS HOLD UP SOUTHERN PACIFIC TRAIN.

Reno, Nev., Nov. 12-Armed bandits held up the overland limited, westbound, at Carlin Saturday night and escaped with the suit cases of passengers and the money sack of Conductor Conn. The rail-road men at Sparks state that they se-cured about \$1,000 in all. A posse was formed and a pitched battle took place at the edge of the town, 100 shots being fired. No one is known to have been injured. Southern Pacific detectives and deputy sheriffs are now hot on the trail of the robbers.

FACES DEATH OFTEN.

J. G. Rawlings Sentenced to Die for the

Before sentence was passed to-day. Rawlings protested innocence of him-soff and his sons, warning the court. "If you don't give us a new trial, our blood will be upon your hands." Rawlings, his three sons and Aif. Moore, a negro, were convicted of the murder of two children of the Carter family, near Valdosta, more than a year ago. One son was given a life sentence, the other four helng under sentence of death.

CHINESE ORDERED DEPORTED.

Providence, R. I., Nov. 12.-United States Commissioner W. P. Cross today ordered the deportation of 14 Chinamen who came to this city on board the smug-gling schooner. Frolic. Nine others cap-nired, who furnished 3500 haft, failed to appear, but were represented by their counsel. appear, counsel.

FOREST FIRE RAGING.

Los Angeles. Nov 12.-A big forest fire is raging in the Arroyo Seco in the vi-cinity of Devil's Gate, and much valu-able property is endangered. An appeal for aid in fighting the fiames has been made to the Pasadena board of trade, which has responded with more than a hundred men. Forest rangers are in charge of the fight against the fire. An-other fire is burning near Tropico.
