It states that the corporation doing business in the state under an outside charter must have an office in the state and provides further "that in case the principal place of business of such cor-poration shall be removed out of the state, that there shall be an agent of make corporation has amounted in this such corporation be appointed in this state, in the county where the property is situated, upon whom all legal pro-cess may be served, and the failure of such corporation to appoint such agent, shall be subject to a fine of \$50 per day, to be recovered in the manner of the state of Nevada as in the fines and penalties."

### BUTTE REDUCTION WORKS.

Plant Totally Destroyed by Fire Early This Morning.

Butte, Mont., Jan. 31 .- The concen-Butte, John, Jan Sh. The Constru-trator of the Batte Reduction works was totally destroyed by fire of un-known origin about 1.30 this morn-ing, entailing a loss estimated in the neighborhood of \$500,000, partially covared by insurance, and practically caus-ing a suspension of the smelter.

Four hundred men are employed at the reduction works, but the major number of these will be afforded em-ployment in the cleaning up of the deorts and wreckage.
