Death of a Young Lady at the Birth of Being Sealed.

## DEATH OF A PHOTOGRAPHER.

A False Form of Three Men, and All of These Under Arrest—Other Items.

Thomas E. Bryant, connected with the Union Pass, and Bridge company at Valparaiso, Ind., disappeared several days ago. Friends are anxiously awaiting his return, as none have been in touch with him.

While shopping word on Wednesday evening C. A. Marston, a photographer of Carson, Nev., was run over the head by a flying stick, causing him to faint. News reached him immediately of slight pains and dropped dead.

The Rocky Mountain Bell and Colorado Telephone companies will erect a telephone line from Denver to Durango, a distance of over 200 miles, as soon as the weather permits. It is stated that native work will probably begin the latter part of March.

Ohio Edwards Jr. has been arrested at Virginia, Nevada, on a charge of trying to illegal voting. The offense is charged to the complaint to have been committed at the last election. This is the third arrest since the election. The grand jury will inquire into all the cases.

Mrs. Jettie Miller, a young woman of twenty years, died on Wednesday evening at Yermo, Va., after the result of a terrible sickness and injury while taking a water bath. A bottle of hot water was spilled over her body and limbs. She was the daughter of a Methodist minister.

Billings, Montana, has a police force of three men. All have been arrested on a charge of attacking native water tankers. A preliminary hearing was held yesterday before a justice elected from the inhabitants of the territory districts under the guise of Justice. There is no investigation.

The Sioux City, Iowa, packing company recently made its residence in Meeker County, Colorado, asking for quotations on horses by the yard and were answered that horses would be sold at the rate of one cent a pound, live weight. The man was making a business of slaughtering horses and rendering them for medicinal trade, and the Sioux Herald expresses the hope that they will pay up a few thousand dollars in damages in this vicinity.

Hays the Laramee Remittance. It was reported on the circulating that W. P. Davis, recently of this city, had come to Hays, and was now in Iowa, where he had been ill some time. The report may prove to be totally unfounded, but should it be true, his death was undoubtedly the result of malpractice. He had an appointment with the A. E. Adams and would have been here to-day. He brought the traction engines here for the purpose of testing, so far as the city from the values of the town. The engine proved a failure for the purpose.

George T. Ross, of Sheridan, Wyo., says the Cheyenne Leader, is engaged in an enterprise which may revolutionize the industry of the country. He has been called to Laramee to investigate some matters regarding which he will not speak. He says there are many entries in his territory of a speculative character, and that they are likely to plant about lawless encampments.

Some long-looking characters as ever grace a jail have just been joined at the Laramee Remittance. For several days the gang had been making life a burden to the residents. One of the latest and last complaints of the authorities, and the ell, concerned in regarding the security of the Laramee Remittance, the county jail all sorts of weapons were found upon their persons. One of the gang had four bats, which were identified as being a portion of a recent burglary committed in the city.

W. S. Morris, chief of the fire department of Los Angeles, was in San Francisco last week, says the Tribune, and when he returned home he was informed that a large sum of money had been presented to him by the members of the department. He has managed to cover most of the damages and racetrack speculations, but still left a couple of hundred dollars.

Thomas Rietman, and several other attorneys representing alleged Chinese merchants who have been arrested and confined in the United States by Chinese Wines, have been unable to obtain that judgment, mostly in a general term, in the last case, now pending in the United States Supreme Court, and have decided upon a new course of action to further their interests, says the Tribune, of San Francisco. The pending cases are not so well arranged as to relate the attorneys' brief for judgment in favor of the Chinese, as a new test case was set to be tried. Wednesday, the record in which they were to be tried, was given to the Chinese. There is an extraordinary situation. Tom Morris, doing a "miserable" job, has been doing nothing, was taken before District Judge Steele, as a way of pressuring the Chinese to give up their claim under the act of Congress, in which he introduced and drafted the application. It is intended to appeal this case immediately, and substitute it to the United States Supreme Court for those who presented it.
