Judge Morse has been here occupying the bench in the district court during the past week, having been invited to come here and determine the rights of the various irrigation companies and individuals who are users of the waters of the Sevier river. The case is enti-tled the Richfield Irrigation company et

the dthe Richfield Irrigation company et al. vs. the Circleville Irrigation com-pany et al., and is of large propor-tions, nearly all of the water rights of Sevier, Plute, Garfield and Emery counties being involved. The court commenced its session last Monday morning, but so far no testimony has been introduced. The different parties to the action and their attorneys have worked hard each day entering into worked hard each day entering into slipulations and so far the progress made has been very satisfactory. Prac-tically all of the rights in Sevier and Plute counties have been agreed upon in this friendly manner. First all the irrigation companies in Sevier county county got together and determined their respective rights as among themselves. This being accomplished they were ready and opened negotiations with the people further up the river and now

the chances for stipulating all of the rights are very favorable. The stipulations filed so far provide that the companies named are the own-
