AERIAL NAVIGATION.

Dr. Graham Bell Thinks Airship Will Soon Cross Atlantic in 20 Hours.

Soon Cross Atlantic in 20 Hours.

London, April 2.—Dr. Alexander Graham Bell, the inventor of the telephone, is quoted in an interview which has appeared here as saying that it was only a question of a brief period when the progress of aerial navigation would make it possible to have dinner in America and breakfast the next morning in Europe, covering the distance across the Atlantic in less than 30 hours.

Dr. Bell said that he expected that an airship would be perfected capable of making 175 to 200 miles an hour. He was also of the opinion that the next step in aerial flight would take the form of such improvements as would make possible the creation of aerial battleships. He was of the opinion that America would be the first country to perfect areial battleships.

EDISON'S WORK.

Will be Along Purely Scientific Lines In Electricity.

New York, Abril 29.—Thomas Edison, who has returned to his home after a vacation of several weeks in Florida, will start tomerrow on the new line of work he mapped out on his sixtieth birthday, just before he went away.

The inventor will hereafter devote his time to the purely scientific side of electrical work. Mr. Edison put in some good tarpoon fishing and made several fine eatches. He is much improved in health.

CONCEALED WEAPONS.

Italian Immigrants Compelled to Surrender Them Before Landing.

New York, April 29 .- Nearly 2,000 immi-New York, April 29.—Nearly 2,000 immigrants on the steamships Citta di Milano and Nord America, of the Italian line, just in from Naples and Genoa, got a taste of the laws of the country when agents of the line appeared on the bridge of each vessel and shouted that all weapons and knives must be thrown away or left with the officers of the ship before the immigrants would be allowed to land. There was an instantaneous shower of stillettoe, ugly looking knives and revolvers of modern and ancient makes. Tomorrow, when the immigrants land on Ellis Island, it is believed they will be the most harmless set of allens received there in many a day.

Chicage, April 25.—Crashing through an outer door with an axe, three men attacked John Morris and his wife with knives in their home, 52 Sholto street, enrily yesterday. They left Morris dead and his wife severely wounded. The motive for the murder is believed by the police to have been revenge for an affront placed on the men by Morris, their former friend, in ordering them from his home one night last week. It was accomplished after the couple had barricaded the door against them with every movable piece of furniture at hand. Five men were arrested. They are said to be members of the "Sholto street gang." They are Michael O'Shea, Jerry Sullivan and William Sheehan, who have been identified by Mrs. Morris, and Geo. Reed and James Hansen, friends of the others who are held pending a coroner's inquest. According to the police the men arrested were frequent visitors at the Morrishome. After Morris drove them out because of a quarrel which was of a trivial nature, they theretoned to kill him, according to Mr. Morris. MERGED INTO U. S. AMUSEMENT COMPANY.

Khaw & Erlanger stated tonight that the arrangement will clear the theatrical atmosphere, adding that while there was an enormous business to support "popular-price" and vaudeville attractions, the higher class theatres necessarily catered to a minority. They further stated that the new arrangement will in no way affect their syndicate.
