

TAFT IN THE RACE FOR PRESIDENCY

Such is Announcement Made by State Commissioner of Insurance Vorys of Ohio.

HE IS MANAGING THE CANVASS

Secretary Gratified at Convincing Evidence of Party's Support in His State—Yale Men Tell for Him.

Columbus, O., April 27.—That William H. Taft, secretary of war, is in the canvass for the Republican nomination for president to stay in effect, the announcement made tonight by A. I. Vorys, state commissioner of insurance, who is managing the Taft canvass in Ohio.

Mr. Vorys went to Cincinnati today and had a conference with Secy. Taft. He returned to Columbus tonight and gave out the following statement: "I have talked with Secy. Taft and submitted to him convincing evidence that the Republicans of Ohio favor him as the Republican candidate for the presidency. He was gratified at the information. He said that some months ago he had announced that, while his ambition was not political, he would accept the nomination if it came to him. He added that in view of the fact that his name had been used and support for him invoked by his friends, good faith requires that he should not alter his position until the question of his nomination is settled."

YALE MEN FOR HIM

Cincinnati, O., April 27.—Smoking the pipe of peace with the white, but with his friends carrying a war banner within easy reach, Secy. of War Taft today returned to his home reservation. His public utterances were devoid of political import, and his private words were those of harmony and good will. During the afternoon, however, he sat in political council with the wise men and throughout the day the sounds of bellicent young big discalp dances and made political war talk.

The secretary himself was consistently silent upon all matters relating to the present trip. Senator Foraker, the leader of the faction opposing the secretary in this state, has sustained a deep personal sorrow in the death of his brother, James E. Foraker. It is therefore certain that there can be during the present trip no political argument or debate between the secretary and the senator.

The friends of the secretary were more demonstrative than he, and chief among them were the men from Yale, who came here as did the secretary to attend the annual convention of the associated Western Yale clubs. Secy. Taft, as president of the organization, held the gavel at the business meeting this morning, and again in the banquet in the evening. Although the secretary said he would not allude to politics, there was no such restraint upon the young men from Yale. They hailed from nearly every state between the Alleghenies and the Mississippi and many were present from the south. Their allusions to the "next president of the United States" were frequent and popular. The sentiment could not be downed, although the secretary ignored it as well as he could.

The first outbreak came in the morning. The secretary, as presiding officer, had announced the personnel of a nominating committee and mentioned the offices they were to fill. As he finished a voice cried out "accept the nomination" and so nominate the next president of the United States." A spontaneous yell came from the convention, but the secretary was unmoved.

At tonight's banquet, however, signs of the coming presidential campaign were plentiful. The secretary himself was at all times non-committal, but for the men from Yale, the bow of presidential promise was already arching the sky and it formed a political halo for the head of Taft of Yale. So they rendered great glory to the school in that it had sent forth the man.

CONSUMPTION OF SUGAR.

For Fiscal Year Ending in June Will Probably be Greatest on Record.

Washington, April 28.—The consumption of sugar in the United States for the fiscal year which ends with June will probably be greater than any other year in the history of the country, according to a statement issued by the bureau of statistics of the department of commerce and labor today. The total quantity of sugar imported in the nine months ending with March, last, was 1,000,000 pounds, or 100,000 tons, figures which are for the same period of the year.

CONCEALED WEAPONS.

Italian Immigrants Compelled to Surrender Them Before Landing.

New York, April 28.—Nearly 2,000 immigrants on the steamships Citta di Milano and Nord America, of the Italian line, just in from Naples and Genoa, got a taste of the laws of the country when agents of the bureau of immigration of each vessel and shouted that all weapons and knives must be thrown away or left with the officers of the ship before the immigrants would be allowed to land. There was an instantaneous shower of pistols, bayonets, knives and revolvers of modern and ancient makes. Tomorrow, when the immigrants land on Ellis Island, it is believed they will be met by a general collection of arms and knives in many a day.

Beveridge Says Time Will Come When Must Cease Interfering With National Highways.

GREAT PRAISE FOR PRESIDENT

"If Child He Be, God Give Us More Such Children to Serve and Bless This Nation."

Galena, Ill., April 27.—The birthday of Gen. Grant was celebrated today for the seventeenth time. This morning the cornerstone of the Carnegie-Foyt \$50,000 library building was laid. The commemorative exercises took place this afternoon in Grant park. The orator of the day was Senator Beveridge. Senator Beveridge said that it was fitting at a "celebration of the birthday of Gen. Grant, the meaning of whose life work was the ever-increasing unity of the American people into an ever stronger growing nation," to discuss the question of states' rights.

"The time must come," he said, "when states must reduce their interference with national highways passing through them, or, better still, stop interference altogether. That time will be delayed because of selfish interests because of the recrudescence of states' rights with which we are now troubled, but chiefly because of demagogues who seek position and power by attacking these most conspicuous of national corporations. The American people are as much in danger from the demagogues who selfishly and ignorantly seek to exploit the states' rights as they are from the demagogues who seek to exploit the national corporations." The senator discussed the dangers of overcapitalization and pointed out the necessity of compulsory publicity in corporate affairs and national incorporation of great enterprises. Another great reform which the nation must work out, he said, is prevention of child labor.

"On the question of ending the barbarism of child slavery in the republic," he said, "I only voice the unspoken thought when I say that the great successor of Washington in his time, of Jackson in his time, of Lincoln and of Grant in their time, is in our time Theodore Roosevelt." "And today, like Washington, like Jackson, like Lincoln, and like Grant, Roosevelt is singularly assisted by similar men. Like them, he has been called a despot. Like them and like all the great men of all countries and of all times, he has been called a socialist and 'insane.' To little minds the great has always been both vain and mad. But of our president, who is great only because he is strong enough to reflect the purposes of ninety millions of people, the final charge that he is a 'child' was made the other day by a brilliant editor in an article speech.

"If child he be, God give us more such children to serve and to bless this nation. God grant that such stock shall not run out."

HUSBAND MURDERED AND WIFE SERIOUSLY WOUNDED

Chicago, April 28.—Crashing through an outer door with an axe, three men attacked John Morris and his wife with knives in their hands and struck them dead yesterday. They left Morris dead and his wife severely wounded. The motive for the murder is believed to be that the couple had barricaded the door against them with every movable piece of furniture at hand.

The men were arrested. They are said to be members of the "Belle Harbor gang." They are Michael O'Shea, Jerry Sullivan and William Sheehan, who have been identified by Mrs. Morris and Geo. Reed and James Hansen, friends of the others who are held pending a coroner's inquest.

According to the police the men arrested were frequent visitors at the Morris home. After Morris was shot he fell because of a quarrel which was of a trivial nature, they threatened to kill him, according to Mr. Morris.

MERGED INTO U. S. AMUSEMENT COMPANY.

New York, April 28.—The Klaw & Erlanger and Shubert theaters and interests, it was announced tonight, have been merged as the United States Amusement company.

The new company was incorporated in New Jersey today and the following officers were elected: A. P. Erlanger, president; Lee Shubert, vice-president; Marc Klaw, treasurer; James P. McGovern, secretary; Levy Mayer of Chicago, general counsel. The executive committee consists of A. L. Erlanger, Lee Shubert and Marc Klaw. The new company immediately acquired from Shubert and Erlanger all the theatres in many cities, including Kansas City and Denver. The new company at the same time acquired from Klaw & Erlanger and their associates theatres in Boston, Brooklyn, Philadelphia and New York. One million dollars was paid into the new company for which stock was issued, the company retaining the right to increase its capital to meet requirements. While the character of the United States Amusement company gives it unlimited theatrical and amusement powers, its efforts will be in the direction of vaudeville.

Klaw & Erlanger stated tonight that the arrangement will clear the theatrical atmosphere, adding that while there was an enormous business to support "popular-price" and vaudeville attractions, the higher class theatres necessarily catered to a minority. They further stated that the new arrangement will in no way affect their syndicate. The Messrs. Shubert expressed their approval as being pleased with the arrangement, as it violates none of their existing obligations.

EXCITING CHASE AFTER PRISONERS

Nevada Officers Follow Them Across State and Have a Desperate Fight.

WERE THROWN FROM TRAIN.

Wells, Nev., April 27.—After an exciting chase across the state of Nevada, lasting since last Wednesday morning, four prisoners who escaped from the county jail at Fallon were recaptured at Montello, near here, at an early hour this morning. The capture was effected by Deputy Sheriff Arriher and another deputy of Churchill county, after a desperate and dangerous encounter, in which Arriher and his assistant were held up and robbed by the quartet of prisoners. Shortly after the escape of the men from the Fallon jail, Arriher was put upon their trail. Selecting another deputy to assist him, Arriher and the assistant disguised themselves in the clothing of "hoboes" and took to the road, having every appearance of being genuine tramps.

EPISCOPAL CONVOCATION IN BOISE WEDNESDAY NEXT.

Boise, Idaho, April 28.—The fifth annual convocation of the seventh missionary department of the Episcopal church will assemble here on Wednesday next. The following territory will be represented: New Mexico, Arizona, Utah, Western Colorado, Nevada, Oregon, California, Washington, Idaho, and Alaska. Some of the clergymen are already on the ground, including Bishop Tuttle, the presiding bishop of the church in this country. He was bishop of this district in his younger days. Today he held services in the cathedral, which has risen to supersede the original St. Michaels church built by him, the first Episcopal church in this state.
