SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL.

Mayor Glasmann Calls Attention To Deplorable Condition of Sidewalks.

OGDEN'S DEATH ACCIDENTAL.

Verdict of Coroner's Jury—John C. Stone Arrested for Assault—County Wins in School Suit.

The city council met last evening and transacted the following business:

Mayor Glasmann gave the council notice of his intention to leave the city for a few days and F. W. Chambers was appointed mayor pro tem during his absence.

Mayor Glasmann asked the council to take some action looking to a more perfect drainage of lower Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets and the matter was referred to street committee and city engineer.

Attention was also called by the mayor to the deplorable condition of the sidewalk in certain business portions of the city, and suggested that some action be taken to give the necessary repairs.

The \$200 appropriation made by the council at its last meeting to rebuild sidewalks on Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets, at the city's expense, was voted by the mayor, and action was deferred one week.

Remission was given to the O. S. L. Ry. Co. to connect its track with the Ogden Rapid Transit Co.'s tracks at Five Points on Washington Avenue.

Several offers having been made for city property situated near the Ogden river bridge on Washington Ave., the matter was referred to the public lands committee.

The health inspector's report for the month of September was submitted, showing 23 deaths from all causes, two cases of scarlet fever were reported under quarantine at the present time.

An election committee consisting of Nye, Powers and Williams, was appointed to make the necessary arrangements for the coming city election.

OGDEN'S DEATH INVESTIGATED.

Yesterday evening at Larkin's undertaking parlors, Tenth and First streets, the death of Daniel H. Ogden was concluded. The new testimony taken did not throw any additional light upon the matter and the jurors returned the following verdict:

That the said D. H. Ogden came to his death as the result of accidental shooting, he being struck in the head by a stray bullet from a gun in the hands of a person to the jurors unknown.

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Mr. Brown was of the opinion that he was within the law in appointing a deputy which he had done in the person of Principal G. N. Child of Lehi, without presenting the name of Mr. Child to the board for confirmation. The board, however, had the opinion of Atty.-Gen. Brecken to back them in their contention that they had the right to confirm. Supt. Brown stated that as it seemed to him that the board intended to appoint a deputy he would not insist upon it and would not submit a name.

The board remained with the decision, and the question of the deputy was held over for two weeks. In that time it is expected Supt. Brown will decide whether he will resign from the academy or as county superintendent, or whether he will contend that he is complying with the law by giving to the public schools sufficient time to properly supervise them. In that case it seems probable that the board will remove or attempt to remove Mr. Brown. In that event the question of the power of the board under the law, to remove him may have to be settled in the courts. It is not known, however, that Mr. Brown intends to contest this point.
