Now this may be a healthy diet, but misgivings will naturally arise in one's mind upon the subject, and we who buy pork or bacon in Utah, shipped from the East, run some considerable risk of buying the diseased meat, for that there is an abundance of it in the market there can be no doubt, and from what I can learn the history of this State is but a repetition of the history of all portions of the hog producing country of the States. Certainly some more appropriate use could be found for our

money than expending it for dis-eased meat, to poison ourselves In passing about the country I often meet with those who have friends and relatives among us, that they have not heard from for years, and the universal feeling is an anxiety to know something of them. If those in Utah, who have friends and relations in the States, would write to them, it would do much to allay the prejudice and bad feeling that we so often meet, and would be the means of bringing many to a knowledge of the truth, by causing them to investigate. I am satisfied that we as a people neglect this important means of conveying information to the world entirely
