

DESERET EVENING NEWS FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY EDITION.

On June 15th, 1900, the "News" will celebrate its Fiftieth Anniversary. Saturday, June 15th, will be the opening of its 51st year, and on that date the paper will issue a specially enlarged and attractive edition in commemoration of the occasion.

Spohr; "A Brief History of Utah Journalism," "Development of Salt Lake in Fifty Years," "Growth of Utah in Fifty Years," and many other timely articles by members of the "News" staff.

Another interesting feature of the issue will be the presentation to each subscriber of the daily, Saturday and Semi-Weekly "News" of a fac-simile of the first number of the paper issued—an exact reproduction of the "Deseret News" as it came from the primitive press brought over by the Pioneers, and printed June 15th, 1850.

LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Martin Warner company of Baltimore, through its local agent, W. H. Beitz, today contributed \$10 to the Scofield relief fund.

The school board held a brief session last evening, the only business transacted being the passage of the appropriation list, amounting to \$2,859.02, for current expenses.

Friends of the High school graduates who wish to send flowers to them, are requested to send them to their homes, as they will not be received at the Theater tonight.

Superintendent Cooper of the public schools announces that his office hours during the summer months will be from 3 to 5 p. m., except on Saturdays, when he will be at his office nearly all day.

The friends of Principal McCoy of the Quirk school will be pleased to learn that he has declined the offer of the school board of Chehalis, Washington, tendering him the superintendency of schools.

A large number of people gathered at the First Methodist church last evening to hear Rev. O. W. Stewart of Chicago, lecture on "Good Citizenship." The discourse was very interesting and called forth much applause.

The Credit Men's association held a meeting last evening, and passed a resolution recommending that all the wholesale houses of the city close at 2 p. m. on Saturdays during the months of June, July, August and September.

The following is from the Denver Post: The stable belonging to H. W. Brown from Salt Lake arrived at Overland track Monday afternoon, and are now safely quartered. The horses are all in good condition.

Superintendent Hines of the water-works department, warns people against sprinkling with their lawn nozzles. It is a great waste, and there is an ordinance against it, the penalty being a fine of not less than \$10. Mr. Hines says he proposes to see that the law is rigidly enforced.

It took nearly all of one man's time in the "News" office Monday morning to get the requests for the art portfolio of the Paris exposition; the expressions of admiration were unbounded, especially in view of the low price charged. Both numbers 1 and 2 of the portfolio are now ready, but the rate of 10 cents is extended to subscribers of the "News" only.

Martin Gavigan, the man who died in the county jail on Monday, was a Knight of Pythias in high standing in his lodge at Fresno, California. T. H. Farnsworth, supreme representative of the local lodge, has received a dispatch from Martin's lodge at Fresno, requesting that Salt Lake Knights take charge of the body and see that it has a respectable burial. Therefore in compliance to the request the Myrtle lodge will bury the body on Thursday afternoon. O'Donnell's undertaking parlors, The Fresno lodge will bear the expenses.

ESTIMATE CITY'S EXPENSES.

City Auditor Furnishes Figures to the City Council.

The city's financial outlook was shown by City Auditor Reiser last evening in the following report, submitted to the City Council:

Estimated expenditures for the current year, based upon the expenditures for two years and five months ending May 31, 1900, \$450,610.68.

Estimated income from various sources, except city taxes, based upon the income of above period of two years and five months, \$259,621.08. Balance, to be provided for by tax levy, \$220,989.60.

MAYOR'S VETO IS SUSTAINED.

Offices of Provisions and Sanitary Inspector are However Abolished.

MR. ROBERTSON'S SURPRISE.

Rescue Home Petition to be Considered on Friday Evening—Miscellaneous Matters.

Dr. Beatty's ordinance providing for the abolition of the offices of provision inspector and sanitary inspector, and imposing the duties of those offices on the health commissioner, with authority to employ what help he might deem necessary, received a death blow at last evening's Council meeting. To pass an ordinance over the Mayor's veto requires ten votes—a two-thirds vote of the Council—and it was believed that at least that number favored the measure. Not so, however, for when President Buckle put the question, "Shall the ordinance passed notwithstanding the Mayor's objection thereto," nine members only voted in favor of the bill and five against. Cottrell, whose vote last week was recorded against the ordinance, was absent. When the result—"The Mayor is sustained"—was announced by the chair considerable surprise was manifested. But it was nothing compared with the one produced later in the evening when Robertson offered a new ordinance abolishing the offices named in the Beatty bill and placing the duties with the health commissioner without conferring on that official the power to appoint his assistants. The new measure passed without debate by a vote of 10 to 4.

The Beatty ordinance over the Mayor's veto was: Beatty, Fernstrom, Gemmell, Howe (Edgar), Howe (C.R.), Reid, Robertson, Tuddenham and Buckle—8. Those who voted to sustain the Mayor were: Canning, Hartenstein, Hewlett, Thomas, and Whittenmore—5. Absent, Cottrell.

The negative votes on the Robertson ordinance were Canning, Hewlett and Thomas. Whittenmore and Cottrell were absent.

The new ordinance came too sudden upon the Mayor last evening to admit of his expressing an opinion on the measure. His honor conceived that the resolution to sustain the Mayor's office it chose to, and the probabilities are the ordinance will meet with his approval. Health Commissioner King will, of course, need help, but it is not probable that he will employ either J. Parley White or J. A. Heles, his honor's appointees for the offices of provision and sanitary inspectors.

RESCUE HOME PETITION.

The petition of the residents of Eighth East, asking that a boundary line be described for the location of the rescue home, and that it be removed from its present location, was referred to the municipal laws committee, with instructions to consider it next Friday evening.

PROTEST DIDN'T GO.

Hewlett offered a resolution providing for the allowing of \$15 a month to the parkkeeper for keeping his horse. Robertson protested against the adoption of the resolution and declared it a scheme to increase the parkkeeper's salary from \$60 to \$75 a month. The resolution was adopted by a vote of 9 to 6.

A RAISE IN WAGES.

Canning introduced a resolution increasing the salary of Phineas Canyon as special policeman in Parley's canyon and deputy land and water commissioner, who is being prosecuted for preventing a herd of cattle from being driven up Parley's canyon on the road near the stream to prevent the befouling of the waters. Mr. Stephens was also instructed to look after the city's interests in the premises generally.

On motion of Thomas, the board of public works was authorized to employ a competent man to inspect the construction of the reservoir on the east bench.

WANTS DAMAGES.

W. E. D. Barnett petitioned the Council to allow him \$500 damages for personal injuries sustained by his tripping and falling over a projection negligently allowed to remain on the sidewalk on the west side of Commercial street. Referred to the committee on claims.

The Bogie Lead company offered the city manager a lead mine in fifteen lots at \$5.75 per 100 pounds. Referred to committee on waterworks.

AN ELECTRIC CLOCK.

J. H. Layson company, the East Temple street jeweler, requested permission to erect in front of its place of business an electric street clock, at the extreme outside of the sidewalk. To make the face of the clock visible at a great distance, petitioner wishes to place the clock on a bracket extending four or five feet from the post over the walk at a height of ten and one half or eleven feet from the walk. To place the clock on top of a building would be to place it in line with numerous telegraph and telephone poles, and could only be seen at a short distance off. Petitioner requests the privilege of erecting the clock as specified. Referred to committee on streets with power to act.

EAGLE GATE STREET CAR TRACK.

The Salt Lake Rapid Transit Railway company, by Baldwin & Hicketts, its attorneys, requested permission to construct an outward track under the Eagle Gate on a straight line. Petitioner says that the double curve under the Eagle Gate is a source of delay and annoyance to traffic. Referred to committee on streets with the city attorney associated.

PROTEST AGAINST TRACK.

Gov. Heber M. Wells and ten others, property owners on First street, protested against the laying of another track on First and State streets, between Eagle Gate and A streets, or disturbing the present track arrangement.
