London, March 2 .- The Hopetown correspondent of the Times, in a dispatch of Feb. 27, which describes Col. Plumer's pursuit of Gen. Dewet, which has been continually hampered by heavy rains, says: "Since Col. Plumer's attack at Wolvekruit, Feb, 15th invaders have behaved like harried hares. The report that Dewet had crossed the river arose from some small parties crossing in a boat at Marksdrift, where Col, Plumer pre-

vented the crossing of the main com-mando and took one hundred prismerns. "After the capture of Dewet's guns Feb. 23 the enemy were in full retreat and ought to have fallen into the hands

of the column from Kimberley, but they stipped past in the night recrossed the railway and are now trying with Hertzog to recross the Orange river at Sand's Drift, but Hertzog's commando has melted away, the majority having been dispersed or having surrendered. "Dewet, in his fanaticism, is reported as demented. It is said that he flogs everybody and that Haasbroeck, who

LITTLE ENOWN OF BOTHA

New York, March 2.-With regard to commandant General Botha of the Boers, the cables keep singularly silent, says the London correspondent of the Tribune. It is now rumored that in his negotiations with Lord Kitchener he has been anxious to know what would be his status when the war was over, and this is said to have caused some delay in announcing the result of the pour parleurs. Mr. Kruger's petition is even said to have been under discussion. The war office, however, maintains silence and nothing is known positively, although surrender rumors are again plentiful.

New York, March 2.-Three expedi-tions from this country to the East Indies to witness the total colipse of the sun on May 17 have already sailed, and sun on May 17 have already sailed, and a fourth will leave today on the steam,-ship Glengary. This includes Prof. David P. Todd, of Amherst college, His wife and daughter and Percy Wilson, who represents the New York Botanical gardens. At one time Prof. Todd hoped to induce Prof. Young of Princeton to comment him but the effort was not accompany him, but the effort was not successful.

The other American astronomers plan The other American astronomers plan to go to Sumatra for the observations but Prof. Todd will make his observa-tions and photographs on the little isi-and of Sinkapa, south of Singapore. The belt of totality is about 150 miles in width and the Amherst party will be calle about 20 miles from its central only about 20 miles from its central line. The duration of the eclipse, it is said, will be about 8 minutes and 15 seconds at that point. Prof. Todd will take with him a 12-inch reflector, which is to be used in an unusual manner, and his famous glycerine clock for con-trolling the movements of his other instruments. He will also make a fresh effort to discover the presence of X-rays in the solar corona, of which he obtained dubious indications in Japan at the time of the eclipse of 1896.

New York, March 2.-It has been learned from a well-informed source that circulars signed by the directors of each of the companies which are to be taken into the United States Steel corporation have been prepared and will be sent out at once to the stockholders, these circulars stating the terms offered by J. Pierpont Morgan & Co., for ex-change of their stock, adding that the signing directors have agreed to turn in their holdings on those terms, and advising the other stockholders also to consent to exchange their shares for stock of the new corporation. It is reported that several additional steel companies are desirous of being

taken into the new combination. Their names are not mentioned, but it is hinted that among them are the Tennessee Coal and Iron company and the Sloss Sheffieul Iron and Steel company. Both are southern companies. In financial circles, however, as well as in the trade, it is believed that the United States Steel corporation, will not for the pres-ent, at least, absorb any companies oth-er than those already accepted by the underwriting systems, although it is said that the American Bridge company may come in at some future date.

al Association of Machinists has pre pared an agreement which within a few days will be sent to every employer of machinists in the country. It regulates hours and wages for one year beginning May 20. It demands an increase of 121/2 per cent in wages over the present rate.

Other provisions are a nine-hour day or fifty-four hours a week; time and a half for over time until midnight and after that double time, including Sundays and legal holidays; grievances to be settled wherever possible by conferences between the employer and em-ployes, and where that fails they must be referred to arbitration; night gangs to receive over time when they work over fifty-four hours a week.

The agreement applies to every em-ployer in the United States and Canada, unless a specific rate of wages is al-ready provided for in existing agree-Under the terms of the New ments York agreement the demands will be referred to arbitration where the employer is a member of the metal manufacturers' association.

ADMIRAL SAMPSON'S MEMOIRS.

He Is Said to be Working on Them at the Present Time.

Nw York, March 2 .- According to special to the Press from Boston, it has been ascertained in the Charlestown navyyard that Rear Admiral W. T. Sampson is at work upon a volume of Admiral Sampson is memoirs. commital in the matter. His friends are divided.
