OMAHA IS A THRIVING CITY

of the pure western type. With a population of about 90,000, a magnificent showing of public buildings, finely paved streets, a beautiful drive of six miles, blocks of elegant stores and an intelligent business population, it is daily growing as a commercial and railroad centre for western traffic. THAT MEXICAN VOLCANO.

The Destruction it is Causing in Sonora.

The following dispatch appears in the San Francisco Chronicle. As some of the "Mormon" settlements are located in the vicinity of the new volcano, the account will be of special interest to their friends in Utah:

Tucson, Arizona, June 6.—The Star's special from Hermosillo says: Explorers sent out by Governor Torres to ascertain the existence of the volcano as reported near Bavispe, Sonora, have returned. They report an active volcano fourteen miles south-east of Bavispe, in the Sierra Madre mountains. The party could not approach nearer than within four miles of the mountains. The crater was pouring forth immense volumes of smoke, fire and lava. Boiling water issued from the side of the mountain, and lava in vast waves slowly poured down the mountain-side into the cañons, which are being filled up. The boiling water had destroyed all the vegetation in the valleys in the vicinity. One peculiar feature of the volcano is its great activity. Boulders weighing tons are hurled down from the crater.

The exploring party say the noise proceeding from the mountain is most terrific, like a number of engines at work, accompanied by sound of thunder. The air is dense with smoke and cinders. The party had great difficulty in approaching within four miles of the mountains owing to the great chasms made by the earthquake, and all the roads and trails are totally wiped out. The country is fearfully broken up. One of the party states that the country around the vicinity of the volcano for many miles looks like the judgment day. The entire surface of the earth presents a woe-begone appearance. Within ten miles of the volcano the town of Bavispe is a complete ruin. The people have all moved out on the high plains and are living in tents and in mortal fear. There is a constant tremor and a continual series of shocks daily.

Since the first earthquake shock there have been one or more tremors daily throughout Arizona. Last night at 11:30 quite a heavy shock was felt here.

At Jefferson City, Montana, on Sunday night, a man named Perry, a bridge builder, fell from one of the high trestles on the Northern Pacific road, a distance of about fifty feet, breaking an arm, and being otherwise seriously injured.
