Let him breathe the humid air, moist with the sweat of a million human beings, striving, working, dying in the mad rush for existence which is but a coming fiercer all the time. Let him

realize the full significance of the hives and tenements and flats with from four to 40 or more families housed up together in these so-called homes, where the Hubbard says, "The stork is just being replaced by the Teddy bear," and he will become very much alive to all that Utah stands for.

**BEARER OF FALSE WITNESS.**  
Just as these facts are taking hold on him, he has the opportunity to attend some so-called religious lecture on Utah. He does not know just what to expect, and is astonished by the murky flow of vituperation and abuse, and as the parsimonious hypocrite spreads out his itching palms and in the name of patriotism and chastity tells the most damning falsehoods, the Utah student, who is a native-born, patriotic, with only one ray of living light, modestly burning in the bosom of this sanctimonious liar, he is now far removed from the ninety-nine hundredths of the people on the face of the globe.
