

PLURALITY OF HALF A MILLION.

Pennsylvania Gives Roosevelt the Largest One Ever Given a Presidential Candidate.

OHIO'S PLURALITY, 250,000.

He Will Also Have a Small One in Maryland—Montana Adds to the List.

Philadelphia, Nov. 10.—Complete but unofficial figures received by the Associated Press from every county in the state, with the exception of Allegheny, in which Pittsburg is situated, but from where a close estimate has been obtained, shows that President Roosevelt's plurality in Pennsylvania has reached 464,952, probably the largest plurality ever given a presidential candidate by any state in the political history of the country.

President Roosevelt's total vote, according to figures at hand, is \$30,552, and Judge Parker's \$35,000. McKinley's total vote in 1900 was 712,665, and Bryan's 474,327.

The city of Philadelphia gives Roosevelt a total vote of 257,943 out of 280,715 votes cast for all candidates. Returns from 48 of the 60 counties give Swallow, Prohibition, 237,843 votes. The 18 missing counties in 1900 gave Woolley, Prohibition, 6,548. Woolley's total vote in Pennsylvania four years ago was 257,968.

The returns so far received for Debs, Socialist, are so meager that no approximate total can be given. Incomplete figures from all counties in the state give Elkins a plurality of about 110,000 over Thompson for supreme court judge.

OHIO, 250,000.

Columbus, Nov. 10.—Nearly complete returns tonight show close to 250,000 plurality for the Roosevelt and Fairbanks electors. Only 18 out of the 88 counties in the state have been counted for Parker and only one Democratic congressman has been elected out of 21. State Chairman Harvey Garber, the Democratic candidate in the Fourth district, has 1,500 plurality in a district normally 8,000 Democratic. A conference of Republican leaders was held today, and it was rumored that a plan had been agreed on to secure the elimination of all factional lines and concerted action for the support of Gov. Herrick, who is being op-

posed by the anti-saloon league for renomination and re-election. Chairman Dick denied that the conference had any such significance and declared that the discussion related only to campaign finances.

MARYLAND, 125.

New York, Nov. 10.—After election interest was today suddenly centered upon Maryland in the announcement that that state, yesterday, conceded to the Republicans, is now in doubt. Late returns have reduced Roosevelt's plurality to the narrow figure of 125 and it will take the official count to determine whether Maryland will be placed in the Republican or Democratic column. There is also a possibility that the state's electoral vote will be divided.

Beyond the situation in Maryland and the fact that it is now admitted that Roosevelt carried Missouri, in which state the legislature is also Republican, today's election news is devoid of feature. Returns show steadily increasing Republican pluralities and it now seems probable that Roosevelt's plurality in the popular vote will be in round numbers 2,000,000.

IDAHO, 28,000.

Boise, Idaho, Nov. 10.—There have been no material changes in the election figures. Roosevelt's plurality promises to reach close to 28,000 while that for Gooding for governor will be about 18,000. French for Congress has about 8,000 more than Gooding and the other candidates on the state ticket range between 18,000 and 21,000. The Democrats have elected four members of the legislature, a state senator in Custer, a senator in Elmore, a representative in Elmore and another in Lemhi.

MONTANA, 10,000.

Butte, Mont., Nov. 10.—The returns from Tuesday's election thus far received seem to give the Republicans the best of it in the next legislature. The issue it is figured on actual returns will be: Republicans, 37; Democrats, 21. Senatorial, 4. This senate from present indications, will be 15 Republicans, 10 Democrats and one doubtful. Some of these figures will be disputed by one side or the other, but the figures given are the composite of that which can be made up from the returns received.

Chairman Mandle of the Republican state central committee, said this afternoon that Roosevelt's plurality in Montana is 10,000, and that Dixon, for congress, has a plurality of 5,000.

Complete returns from 50 out of 64 precincts in this county (Silver Bow) indicate that the Fusionists, commonly known as the Heinze parties, have carried everything on the county ticket with the exception of the district judge.

WHAT JUDGE HERRICK SAYS.

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 10.—Judge D. Cady Herrick, the defeated candidate of the Democratic party for governor, will leave tomorrow for an extended visit to Havana. His friends say that his health was poor when he accepted the nomination, and that, while he stood the vigorous work of the campaign well, he is now in need of rest and recuperation. Upon his return he will resume the practice of law. In discussing the result of the election, Judge Herrick said: "Perhaps the Republican party would

RUSSIA FEELS RATHER BRITATED

Lausdowne's Veiled Suggestion of An Arbitration Finds No Favorable Echo

ITS SOURCE IS AGAINST IT.

United States Has No Intention of Taking the Initiative in Intervention.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 10.—In official circles Lord Lausdowne's veiled suggestion that the Russo-Japanese conflict might be settled by arbitration finds an unfavorable echo. The sentiment prevails stronger than ever that Russia's prestige must be vindicated before the idea of peace can be entertained.

The mere fact that the suggestion came from Great Britain's foreign secretary does not tend to its kindly reception here. The firm conviction is expressed that Lord Lausdowne's suggestion could not have been the result of an understanding between the British and French governments, it being stated that the Russian view of the situation is too well known to her ally to make it possible that she could have been privy to such a move. The general opinion is that Lord Lausdowne's suggestion was in the nature of a personal trial balloon.

Hopeless as is the idea of bringing the war to a conclusion, it seems, however, that there are those in high quarters who consider that there is a bare possibility of bringing the conflict to a close on the basis of arbitration if such a proposition came directly from Japanese. Indeed, it is even intimated that Lord Lausdowne's suggestion may have been inspired from Tokyo. Russia has announced again and again that no proposition from an uninterested power would even be answered, but that any proposition from Japanese direct, no matter through what intermediaries, would be considered. A proposal from Japan to arbitrate the conflict would appeal strongly to Emperor Nicholas. He is extremely proud of being the author of the Hague conference, and in spite of the difficult position in which the Russian military prestige would be left by a cessation of hostilities at this juncture, should be competent to judge actually entertain the belief that such an offer on the part of Japan would not be in vain.

UNITED STATES ATTITUDE

Washington, Nov. 10.—Emphatically, but with all courtesy, Russia, through her ambassadors abroad, has several times informed the neutral powers that she will brook no mediation at this time in her war with Japan. It can be announced that Russia expects her wishes will be respected by all the powers to which Russia has communicated her views.

Count Cassini tonight said to the representative of the Associated Press: "I have very good reasons to announce that my government's emphatic opposition to any mediation at this time will be respected and observed by all neutral powers."

Of the suggestion made in Great Britain that the United States head a movement for intervention, the ambassador hesitated to repeat what he has announced so many times, that he has positive assurance that this government, while at all times ready to offer its services, has not the slightest intention to take a step toward mediation unless invited by both belligerents. The Russian government is fully aware of the views of this government on the subject, and it is deemed unnecessary at the Russian embassy here again to announce that it is confident this attitude will be strictly adhered to.

OSCAR STRAUSS' VIEWS

New York, Nov. 11.—Former Minister to Turkey Oscar S. Strauss, a member of The Hague tribunal, expresses the belief that a sudden termination of hostilities in the far east is possible in the near future.

"I have long had the impression," he said, "that we will wake up some morning and find that through the good offices of Great Britain, with the tacit consent of the signatory powers to the treaty of Berlin, an arrangement has been agreed upon by which the far eastern questions will have been settled by one stroke. That is to say, Russia will have come to an agreement with Great Britain, and secondarily with the signatory powers, for having free access to the sea through the Dardanelles in return for which a permanent adjustment of the Afghan boundary and Great Britain's domination of the Persian gulf will be granted, and that in the far east, Japan's sphere of influence will be recognized in Korea, while Manchuria, with certain rights to Japan secured, will revert to China. This done the peace of the world will be insured certainly for our generation, and by the end of that time, the nations will have become so accustomed to availing themselves of The Hague tribunal that wars will be largely eliminated."

Fushimi Off for Washington.

San Francisco, Nov. 10.—Prince Fushimi of Japan, accompanied by his suite, left today for Washington. He will make no stop on his way to the national capital.

San Francisco, Nov. 11.—The supreme court of the United States has affirmed the sentence of the United States district court of this city in sentencing George P. SETTLING A QUARREL.

Up to Date Three Men Are Dead, And More to Come.

Huntington, W. Va., Nov. 10.—Sheriff Daniels of Fayette county and John Rolf, a prominent citizen. Montgomery, were shot and killed today by Harvey Jackson in Montgomery, a small hamlet near Fayette. Today's killing grew out of a quarrel last night, in which Policeman Will Elliott shot and killed Constable W. A. Jackson. Harvey Jackson, a brother of W. A. Jackson, and two other brothers, are said to have armed themselves and started out to "clean up" the entire police force of the town. Sheriff Daniels was sent for and ordered Harvey Jackson to leave town under penalty of being arrested. Jackson, without a word, shot the sheriff dead. John Rolf who saw the shooting, threw his hands and advanced to negotiate with Jackson and help Daniels. Jackson shot Rolf dead. The three Jacksons fled to the woods, and 100 men are in pursuit.

Baltic Squadron Reports.

Canea, Island of Crete, Nov. 10.—The battleship Sissoi Veliki, with Vice Admiral Voiskensan aboard, and the battleship Navarin, the cruisers Izumrud and Almaz, a number of torpedo boats and transports and the volunteer steamer Yaroslav of the Russian Baltic squadron have arrived in Suda bay.

Dead in a Lodging-House.

Tonopah, Nev., Nov. 10.—Samuel Warwick of Waco, Tex., was found dead in bed in a lodginghouse today. He arrived here two weeks ago with about \$1,000, but only 43¢ was found in his pockets. His death is attributed to heart failure.

Waggaman Collection to be Sold.

New York, Nov. 11.—One of the largest art sales in recent years will be held in this city late in January or early in February when the Waggaman collection will be auctioned off. The sale has been ordered by the trustees in bankruptcy who are in possession of the property which is part of the estate of Thomas E. Waggaman of Washington, until recently treasurer of the Catholic university at Washington. There are more than 3,000 articles in the collection including some hundreds of paintings and specimens of ceramic art from modern to early times. It cost Mr. Waggaman about \$500,000, and required 20 years to make the collection, which is now valued at \$1,000,000.

Big Vote for Debs.

Chicago, Nov. 9.—Socialist leaders declare that Chicago has given 46,000 votes to E. V. Debs, his candidate for president, and that the state total will be 30,000.

Fell Dead While Reading.

Southampton, Conn., Nov. 10.—Mrs. Charles W. Pickett, wife of Col. Charles W. Pickett, editor of the New Haven Leader, dropped dead of heart disease while reading a paper before the Daughters of the American Revolution.
