INTERESTING LEGAL QUESTION.

Does Time for Motion for a New Trial, Lapsing on Holiday, Extend to Next Day?

BIG DAMAGE SUITS INVOLVED.

Opera House Inspected as to Fire Escapes-Boyle Furniture Co. Elects Officers-News in Brief.

One of the most interesting points of law that has been argued in the district court for some time was heard yesterday by Judge Rolapp, the arguments lasting all day.

The arguments were on motions for new trials in the cases of Jane L. Warner and Georgia Crockett against the Union Pacific. In November last Jane L. Warner was awarded \$8,600 damages in a suit against the Union Pacific, and in the same month Georgia Crockett was awarded \$12,000 against the same company. In both cases the railroad company was given until Nov. 16 to file motion for a new trial, but as the 26th was Thanksgiving day and a legal holiday, the motion was not filed until Nov. 27, the day following. It was argued by the attorneys of the sueing parties that the defendant's time in which to file motion for a new trial expired at midnight, Nov. 25; as the or-der of the court was that the defense had until Nov. 26 to file the motion and not until and including Nov. 28. On the last date application was made to Judge Rolapp over the telephone for an extension of time, the judge being at Farmington. The extension was granted until Dec. 6, and as that day was Sunday, Judge Young for the railroad
