Conkling, from the judiciary committee, reported, with an amendment, the House bill to protect persons of foreign birth against involuntary servitude; placed on the calendar Sargent withdrew the motion en-tered by him to reconsider the vote by which the bill authorizing ap-pointments and promotions in the medical and ordnance departments of the army was passed on Satur-

Frelinghuysen gave notice that after the post office appropriation bill was disposed of, he would ask the Senate to proceed with the consideration of the bill for the anforcement of the laws of the U. S. in the Territory of Utah.
