MISCELLANEOUS.

WASHINGTON, 15.—Hampshire in-

troduced a bill to provide for the

prepayment of postage on printed

matters referred.

The chair announced Freling-

huysen, Wright and Thurman the

Senate conference on the Geneva

award bill, Edmunds who moved

for the conference, proceeded to be

excused from sitting.

The Senate then proceeded to the

consideration of the resolution

instructing the committee on ap-

propriations to report an amend-

ment to the bill for a survey of four

routes from the Mississippi River

to the Atlantic seaboard, recom-

mended by the special committee

on transportation. The resolution

was agreed to, 42 to 6.

Edmunds submitted the conference

report on the bankrupt bill,

which was read a second time. The

bill is substantially the same as passed

by the Senate with the exception that

the percentage of the liabilities

which the involuntary bankrupt is

required to pay to secure a discharge

is fixed at thirty instead of thirty-

three per cent, with the consent of

one-fourth of the number of credi-

tors representing a third of the

amount of the indebtedness.

The post office appropriation bill

was then taken up. The Senate, on

motion of Stevenson, took up the

bill to pay John Anderson of

Ky, for cotton belonging to him

used in the defense of Nashville.

Pending the discussion, Conkling

raised a point of order, claiming

quorum was present, and the Sen-

ate adjourned.

Bill to Remove Causes—The Utah

Bill, &c.

Carpenter, from the committee

on the judiciary, reported unfavor-

ably to a number of bills, all of

which were referred to the com-

mittee. He also reported favorably on

the substitute for the House bill re-

gulating the removal of causes from

the State courts to the circuit

courts of the U. S.

Thurman moved to strike out the

eleventh section, which authorizes

the service of process upon an agent

of the defendant in civil and not

affecting the title to real estate;

rejected, yeas 16, nays 40.

Bayard moved an amendment

providing that the bill should

not be taken up until a copy of the

report of the committee on the

subject of the country might be in

the hands of the Senate, simply

serving a process on its agent or

correspondent here.

Wadsworth said this was alarming

legislation, and he could not vote

for such a bill.

Bayard's amendment was reject-

ed, yeas 20, nays 33.

Carpenter moved, to amend the

section by providing that a copy of

the process served under the amend-

ment shall actually be delivered to
