## LITTLE CHILD ASPHYXIATED

Leslie O. Hodgson Dies Suddenly While Under the Influence of Chloroform.

## MINE WORKERS CONVENTION.

OGDEN, June 23.—A sad death occurred yesterday noon, when little Leslie O. Hodgson, the 5-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie S. Hodgson, of 2255 Madison avenue, passed away suddenly while under the influence of chloroform. Drs. J. R. Morrell and E. H. Smith were preparing to operate upon him for tonsillitis, by the removal of the tonsils. Chloroform was administered when he suddenly died. Respiratory paralysis is given as the cause of death by the physicians. Funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock Thursday morning at the home, and in the afternoon of the same day the body will be taken to Salt Lake City for burial.

**CONDITIONS OF FRUIT CROP.**  
OGDEN, June 23.—John Derrick of the Pioneer Fruit company and J. M. Forristal of the Ogden Fruit Growers' association, have returned to Ogden from a tour of inspection through the fruit districts of the state. The towns visited recently were Springville, Provo, and Spanish Fork, where better conditions were found than in the districts of the Bear River valley, and good crops are looked for. The peach crop in the vicinity of Brigham City now promises at least 60 per cent of the crop, and in Bear River valley about 50 per cent of the apple crop will be secured.

## LOGAN BRIEFS.

The Hanson Candy Kitchen has been fined \$12 by Justice Bringham for violating the early closing ordinance.

The county commissioners were in session yesterday and besides routine work they appropriated an amount not to exceed \$250 for the excavation and repair of the Logan river bed near the Logan park grounds, in order that the river waters may be kept in their proper channel. The appropriation was made on petition of Providence citizens.

## COURT AT RICHFIELD—GEO. MORRELL SENTENCED

## CLASS LEGISLATION.

Oregon's Appropriation for Road from Medford to Crater Lake.
