ROOT DENIES MASO'S REQUEST

Will Not Postpone the Cuban Elections.

WHAT EFFECT WOULD BE.

It Would Prolong American Occupation of the Island and Defer Cuban Independence.

Washington, Dec. 17 .- Secy. Root has addressed a letter to Slidele A. Pierra. the representative of the Maso party in Cuba, who is at present in this city, denying his request for a postponement of the Cuban elctions. The secretary's letter, which is dated December 16, is as follows:

"Sir: -The application for postpone ment of the Cuban eletion presented by you on Saturday. December 14, in behalf of the supporters of Gen. Maso, as candidate for president of Cuba, has been carefully considered.

"The effect of granting the application would be to prolong American occupation and postpone the independence of Cuba and the control of the island by the government of her own people. This ought not to be done in the interest of any candidate or without the most weighty and substantial reasons. The substance of reasons which you present is that the central board of scrutiny as now constituted, is composed of gentlemen, none of whom is in favor of Gen. Maso and all of whom are in favor of Gen. Palma, and you declare that that board is un-fair and will be unfair in the performnce of its duties.

"The board to which you refer was constituted without reference to any candidate and before any candidate had been named. It consisted of the president and four of the distinguished members of the constitution." members of the constituional conven-tion elected by the people of Cuba to provide for the establishment of the new government. Washington, Dec. 18.-A new immi-gration bill, which is the joint produc-tion of Senator Penrose and Commis-sioner Gen. Powderly, has been intro-duced in the Senate by Mr. Frye. The bill provides an educational test, and in addition to the present system of domestic inspection of immigrants, au-
