CLEVELAND OUT OF POLITICS The Ex-President Says that He is Out for Good.

New York, March 9 .- Former President Grover Cleveland denied today that he had come to New York for any political purpose, as was rumored yesterday. He said:

"I came solely for the purpose of addressing the meeting in Brooklyn last night. The reports that I had a talk with Edward Shepard are unitue. I am not in politics. I am out for good. I saw Mr. Shepard last night for only two minutes, and politics did not fig ure in our conversation. Politics is furthest from my thoughts at present although I am always ready to act in ar advisory capacity if so desired. As for taking any active part in politics, that is not to be considered."

RUM TIMES ON THE M'NEIL, Sailors Charge that the Officers Became Intoxicated.

San Francisco, March 9.- Captain Jorgensen and nine of the crew of the American bark Alex McNeil, which strended on Prater's reef, near Hong-kong on Dec. 24, arrived here today on the steamer Coptic from the Orient. The sailors state that shortly after the ves-sel left Hongkong on Dec. 9 last the of-ficers. ficers became intoxicated and the vessel drifted from her proper course, finally bringing up on the reef, where she went to pieces. A drunken fight followed the stranding of the vessel, during which the sailors assert the ship's carpenter emptied his revolver at the officers, but he was too intoxicated to aim with precision and no one was in-jured. A boat containing the first mate and four of the crew was lost and no race of the men was found. The names f the men follow: Chief Mate Evans,

The Pope Rolds a Reception.

Paris, March 9 .- A special dispatch from Rome says a correspondent has obtained an interview with a prelate

attached to the vatican, showing the real state of the pope's health.

"The reception of 5,000 pilgrims yesterday did not fatigue the pontiff seriously," the correspondent asserts. "In fact the audiences and recent solemnities ties seem to have had the effect of stimulating the vital forces of the man His chief sources of fatigue have been the giving of fong private audiences and serious work with the cardinals and of the vatican.

"The only thing the matter with the pope is a rather stubborn cold, which can not be expected to be entirely cured before a fortnight. It is only then that Dr. Lapponi can form an opinion as to the pope's weakness, and the result of which may be fatal.

"Although it has been denied, the symptom which is causing Dr. Lapponi the greatest anxiety recently is a slight disorder of the digestive and intestinal functions. For the present the catarrh with which the pope has been suffering s slowly but continually improving.

Glazed Parsnips.

Boil the parsnips in their skins, until tender, remove the skins and cut into effices about one-quarter of an inch. Melt one tablespoonful of butter, in a sugar, cook until it browns, then add the parsnips, brown first on one side, then on the other and serve hot.

Parsnip Balls.

Cold smashed parsnips may be re-heated in this manner and serve as, a nice garnish for fish. Allow to each pint of the mashed and seasoned parsmixture out into balls; dip same as croquettes, first in beaten egg. then into bread crumbs and fry a nice brown in deep hot feet.

Parsnip Puff's.

Take two well beaten eggs, two cups of sifted flour mixed with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, and a level teaspoonful of salt; two cups of well mashed parsnips and two cups of cold water. Mix all together very lightly only stirring around to mix thereugh. -only stirring enough to mix thoroughly. Do not let the mixture stand after putting together, but drop at once by tablespoonful into hot fat and cook a nice brown.

Parsnip Soup.

Wash, scrape and thinly slice enough parsnips to make a quart. Pare and slice a pint of potatives. If the parsnips are young and tender they will cook in about the same time as the potatoes; if not, put them on first; add just enough water to cook in a chough water to cook them tender. Add to the parsnips, when putting them on to cook, one head of celery, one small onlon and a tiny piece of bay leaf. When vegetables are done, rub through a sieve, season to taste with salt and pepper, add a tablespoonful of butter and sufficient hot milk to make the soup the right consistency. Serve very


