

GOVERNMENT FORESTRY POLICY

It is to Protect and Preserve the Remaining Forests.

IS ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY

Hands of Avid Region Are to be Reclaimed—Commissioner Richards Gives His Views.

Washington, March 9.—Commissioner Richards of the general land office, who is the special representative of the president in all matters pertaining to lands, irrigation and forestry, and who was for four years governor of Wyoming, today made the following statement respecting the present and future policy of this administration relative to the establishment and controlling of forest reserves.

"The president's purpose and desire is to protect and preserve the remaining forest lands of the country, and to prevent the destruction of the same. It is his duty to see that the public lands are not squandered, and that the forests are preserved for the benefit of the people. The establishment and proper maintenance of forest reserves is indispensable to the protection and preservation of the public lands, and to the promotion of the general welfare of the country."

tion has given no directions to its forestry officers other than that the local laws shall be enforced. "In some of the western states and territories, notably Wyoming, the government forest rangers are by the law of the state made assistant game wardens of the state. "The work of establishing and maintaining forest reserves will have such a vast and beneficial influence in the settlement and development of the western states and territories that it must be controlled by a fixed policy, in which matters of minor consideration must give way to final and general permanent good. "The only guiding purpose of the administration in dealing with forestry, pastures, irrigation, and with the land generally, is to help and make easy the path of the home-builder, the small ranchman, and not to let the land be exploited and skinned by those who have no permanent interest therein and who do not build homes or remain actual settlers."

CLEVELAND OUT OF POLITICS

The Ex-President Says that He is Out for Good.

New York, March 9.—Former President Grover Cleveland denied today that he had come to New York for any political purpose, as was rumored yesterday. He said: "I came solely for the purpose of addressing the meeting in Brooklyn last night. The reports that I had a talk with Edward Shepard are untrue. I am not in politics. I am out for good. I saw Mr. Shepard last night for only two minutes, and politics did not figure in our conversation. Politics is furthest from my thoughts at present. I am always ready to act in an advisory capacity if so desired. As for taking any active part in politics, that is not to be considered."

"In an interview with a reporter of the Times, this question was submitted to Mr. Cleveland: "We have a situation in which the Republicans are claiming to be able to eliminate trust evils by the use of public measures, and by the enforcement of certain actions regulating commerce, while the Democrats and some of the independent voters, on the other hand, claim that the only adequate remedy is the reform of the tariff, which gives to the trusts the monopoly they enjoy, and hence enable them to endanger the prosperity of the country. In view of this situation, will you state what part you think trusts and tariff will play in the campaign of 1904?" The ex-president said in reply: "You may say this for me—that Mr. Cleveland gave it as his opinion that the trust question would not be eliminated."

from the next presidential canvass, and expressed himself as being entirely unable to see how the question could be wholly divorced from the tariff issue, to say nothing of the absolute necessity of a good old-fashioned interest in tariff reform for its own sake, and what it would do for the people of the country." Mr. Cleveland was asked if he thought the figure of all as an issue within the Democratic party, and he said: "I did not know that any one thought of silver nowadays."

BRYAN ON POLITICS.

Tells of His Trip to New York and Democratic Outlook.

Toledo, O., March 9.—W. J. Bryan, who was in the city this morning, told of his recent visit to New York, and added that the people in that state knew less about politics than they do in the west. "They asked me about Judge Parker," he said, "and I told them I could say nothing until I knew his attitude on national questions. They answered that he was a judge and that it was not proper for him to discuss present topics. "What do you think Hill intends to do?" "Well, I think Mr. Hill is tossing a penny to see whether he or Judge Parker will run. The trouble of the plan is that Hill has an old penny that he has tossed so often that he does not know which side is head and which is tail. "What have you to say regarding the record of Congress?" "What Congress has done is easily ascertained. Find out how much there is in the treasury before the session began, and you will know how much there is now. The wonder is that they did not take it all."

Mr. Bryan declined to discuss the issues and candidates in the next campaign, but when asked to make a statement, said: "Political success depends on two things—opportunity and taking advantage of it. A political party must advocate the policies it believes best for the people, and then it must endeavor to vindicate the wisdom of its course. "I believe the Democratic party has taken the people's side of the public question discussed in 1896 and 1900, and I believe that if it maintains its integrity and allow no doubt to arise as to its fidelity to the people's cause it will, in a question of time, and not a long time either, before enough Republicans will be disgusted with the policy of the Republican party to again join the Democratic party in power. "Such a victory when won will bring relief to the people from all the policies of the Republican party. We cannot win a victory by compromise, and if it would be as disastrous to the Republican party as Cleveland's victory in 1892 proved to be."

Asked as to his opinion on the Wabash, Mr. Bryan said: "The merits of the controversy between the company and its employees are overshadowed by the menace of the process known as government by injunction. The Democratic government has been calling attention to the danger that lurks in the abuse of the judicial power, but it seems to take a severe object lesson to make the people acquainted with a bad policy."

RUM TIMES ON THE M'NEIL.

Sailors Charge that the Officers Became Intoxicated.

San Francisco, March 9.—Captain Jorgensen and nine of the crew of the American bark Alex McNeil, which was on Dec. 21, arrived here today on the steamer Coptic from the Orient. The sailors state that shortly after the vessel left Hongkong on Dec. 9 last the officers became intoxicated and the vessel drifted from her proper course, finally bringing up on the reef, where she went to pieces. A drunken fight followed the stranding of the vessel, during which the sailors assert the ship's carpenter emptied his revolver at the officers, but he was too intoxicated to aim with precision and no one was injured. A boat containing the first mate and four of the crew was lost and no trace of the men was found. The names of the men follow: Chief Mate Evans, Charles O'Brien, William Johnson, Two Russians. The stranded sailors remained on the reef for three weeks, finally putting to sea in an improvised boat, headed for Hongkong. They were picked up by a steamer and taken to Hongkong, where the American consul looked after their comfort. Captain Jorgensen denies that he or any of the officers were drunk. "There was only a gallon of whisky on the ship when we sailed from Manila," he said, "and it had not been touched until after the vessel struck. I gave the men some then, as they were wet and cold, but none of them had enough to intoxicate them."

The Pope Holds a Reception.

Paris, March 9.—A special dispatch from Rome says a correspondent has obtained an interview with a prelate attached to the vatican, showing the real state of the pope's health. "The reception of 5,000 pilgrims yesterday did not fatigue the pontiff seriously," the correspondent asserts. "In fact the audiences and recent solemnities seem to have had the effect of stimulating the vital forces of the man. His chief sources of fatigue have been the giving of long private audiences and serious work with the cardinals and of the vatican. "The only thing the matter with the pope is a rather stubborn cold, which can not be expected to be entirely cured before a fortnight. It is only then that Dr. Laponni can form an opinion as to the pope's weakness, and the result of which may be fatal. "Although it has been denied, the symptom which is causing Dr. Laponni the greatest anxiety recently is a slight disorder of the digestive and intestinal functions. For the present the catarrh with which the pope has been suffering is slowly but continually improving."

Rev. Nutting on Mormonism.

New York, March 9.—The Rev. J. D. Nutting of Cleveland, secretary of the Utah Gospel mission, speaking before the Presbyterian Ministers' Association, said: "The real trouble is that Mormonism is a pagan religion; it has polygamous flesh and bone gods. The common people are sincere, but the priesthood exercises almost unlimited authority, and the organization is more closely knit together than ever before. In former years, most of the members were immigrants. Now two-thirds of them are born Mormons, and they have been trained to hate and distrust the Christians."

Mrs. Langtry Saw Creceus.

Toledo, March 9.—Mrs. Langtry, who is an enthusiastic horsewoman, spent an hour late this afternoon with Creceus, the world's champion trotter. For three-quarters of an hour Mrs. Langtry watched him critically and was very enthusiastic in her admiration of the great trotter. Offer for Lotus Club Property. New York, March 9.—An offer of \$500,000 has been made by John D. Rockefeller in behalf of the Fifth Avenue Baptist church for the property of the Lotus club, on Fifth avenue. The Lotus club, however, has rejected the proposition, declaring that the property is worth \$600,000; but since Mr. Rockefeller is known to be a very desirous of securing the property and will even pay more than its original offer it is believed a deal will be arranged.

SENIERS WERE FIRED UPON.

Attempt Made to Murder Guards at Colorado City.

WERE STATIONED AT MILLS

Was Midnight When Shooting Occurred—Would-be Murderers Were in the Hills—No One Injured.

Colorado Springs, Colo., March 9.—Seniors at three points were fired on shortly after 7 o'clock this evening by unknown parties. At one point an attempt was made to enter the sentry lines and the sentry on guard came near being hit. Information came to the military authorities that a concerted plan was on foot to rush the Portland mill and that warrants charging mill employees with carrying concealed weapons were to be served when the men came from work. When these facts had been laid before Col. James H. Brown, representative of the governor and legal adviser to the national guard, he appeared before Charles Burr, representative of the Western Federation of Miners, and in charge of the strike at Colorado City, and the members of the executive committee of the Mill and Smeltermen's union 215 of Colorado City and announced that if there was any more trouble he would hold each one of them responsible. Other sentries stationed around the three mills were fired upon at midnight. From reports made by the sentries and the flashes from the guns the men doing the shooting were located on the hills surrounding the reduction plants. No one was injured. The cavalry patrolled the country in the vicinity of the mills, but because of the darkness and the rugged character of the country did not succeed in locating the men doing the shooting.
