The last named was master of ceremonies. The exercises began about 3 o'clock in the afternoon, by the singlow of "America."

The opening prayer was offered by B. F. Johnson, followed by the singing Beezley brothers, Matthew Noall, and Elihu Barrell, all of whom have served as missionaries in the Pacific Islands.

The address of the day was made by President George Q. Cannon, whose ap-President George Q. Cannon, whose appearance upon the platform evoked voctferous applause. He spoke on the "Introduction of the Gospel to the Pacific Islanders," and went over the account of that period in a very interesting manner. He was on the islands four years, arriving at Honolulu in 1850, in company with Hiram Clark. Thomas Whittle, Henry W. Bigler, Thomas Morris, John Dixon, William Farrer, James Hawkins, Hiram H. Blackwell and James Keeler, President Cannon translated the Book of Mormon into the Hawaiian.
