officar of the United States, who has pes-session of any such dothes, arms, military outfits or accoutrements, furnished as aforesaid, and which have been the subjects of any such sale, barter, exchange, pledge, loan or gift, shall have any right, title or interest therein; but the same may be seized and taken whereare found by any officer interest therein; but the same may be seized and taken, wherever found, by any officer of the United States, civil or military, and shall thereupon be delivered to any quar-termaster or other officer authorized to received the same; and the possession of such clothes, arms, military outfits or ac-coutrements, by any person not a soldier or officer of the United States, shall be prime facic evidence of such a sale, barter, exchange, pledge, lean or gift as aforesaid. "SECTION 24.—That every person not subject to the rules and articles of war, who shall procure or entice, or attempt to prosubject to the rules and articles of war, who shall procure or entice, or attempt to pro-cure or entice, a soldier, in the service of the United States, to desert; or who shall har-bor, conceal or give employment to a deserter; or carry him away, or aid in car-rying him away, knowing him to be such; or who shall purchase from any soldier his arms, equipments, ammunition, 'aniform, clothing, or any part thereof; and any cap-tain or commanding officer of any ship or vessel, or any superintendent or conductor of any railroad, or any other public con-veyance, carrying away any such soldier, as one of his crew or otherwise, knowing The whole of the production is highly in-teresting and instructive, and will amply repay the visitor. CLOTHING, ARMS, ETC., BELONGING TO U. S .- We had a visit yesterday afternoon from Major Benham, of Camp Douglas, who, at the request of Major General Gibben, Commander of the Rocky Mountain District, called upon us to bring to our attention Sections 23 and 24 of the Act of Congress of March 3rd, 1863, which had been incorporated in General Orders, No. 2, issued from the Headquarters of this District. We understood the Major to say CHRISTMAS & NEW YEAR'S that the General commanding intended to enforce this law; but before doing so wished the public to be informed of is provisions. It is important that all should understand that they are not at liberty to purchase, or receive as pledges, clothes, arms, military outfits or accoutrements, belonging to the Government, from soldiers or others; for many, ignorant of the law on the subject, might do so without having an idea that they were tran sgressing any law.
