A valuable Shetland pony, belonging to Mr. S. W. Sears, of Ogden, died on Sunday from eating too much lucern.

The Wyoming House, at Evanston, was burned down early on Sunday morning. Supposed to have been the work of an incendiary.

Clark, a colored man, at Pioche, who shot Hank Parrish subsequent to his being caught in the wound he received himself, and is not expected to live.

Everybody remembers the laughable "Widow Be-lott" performances of last year. The same piece with a different cast will be produced on the 10th.

Mr. W. H. Stanton, a mining expert of this city, while examining some placer mines in Osceola last week, accidentally fell down a shaft, breaking his leg near the ankle and dislocating one of his shoulders.

Price River, in Castle Valley, is reported to be very high and still rising. Two horses were drowned on the 4th inst. and a couple of men, J. Fielding and J. Masden, of Glenwood, narrowly escaped with their lives.

The well known firm of Day & Co., merchants of this city, exists no more, a dissolution having to day taken place. The business will be conducted at the same place, East Temple Street, by Barnes & Davis, members of the old firm.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Apple Tree Insects.—The Curator of the Museum will be pleased to receive specimens of insects such as infect the apple trees in this city for investigation by the distinguished entomologist Dr. A. S. Packard, who has done so much to benefit this country by his researches in relation to destructive insects.

Philharmonic Concert.—The grand oratorio of "The Creation" will be presented at the Theatre this evening, by the Philharmonic Society of this city. The solos will be sung by six of the principal vocalists of the city, supported by the entire strength of the society. Professor Radcliffe will direct the rendition and also lead the enlarged orchestra. It is bound to be a rich treat, and will no doubt be attended by the public in force.

Drowned.—The Herald (Ogden) learns by private letter from Midway, Wasatch County, that the family of Mr. John Haler, living in Snake Creek Valley, a few miles from the settlement, has been afflicted by a deplorable accident. On the 19th of April their little daughter Matilda, born May 18, 1877, fell into Snake Creek in an unwatched moment, and was drowned in the foaming torrent. The corpse of the little one was found an hour after by the sorrowful father.

Sudden Separation.—On Sunday afternoon, Nels Larsen, a blond man, was driving his wagon, containing his wife and several children home from meeting, when upon passing the Eagle Cafe, going eastward, the kingbolt broke and away went the horse, leaving the tongue and forewheels, leaving the driver and other inmates upon the ground with the box and hindwheels. The party, one of whom was an infant, were pretty well shaken up by the fall, and it was thought the baby's thumb was sprained, but no further damage was reported.

The Dentaphone.—We have been shown a specimen of the beneficent invention known as the Dentaphone, by means of which persons deprived of the sense of hearing through the ordinary medium of the ear, are enabled to apprehend sounds through the teeth—hence the name dentaphone. The article is the property of Mr. H. C. Barrell, of the 18th Ward, who purchased it for his wife, who has been deaf and dumb from her birth. By means of the instrument, she is now enabled to hear sounds, and though unable to understand the words, having never been taught them, the dentaphone undoubtedly will be of future service to her in acquiring a knowledge of the language. She manifested much delight in listening to the music of the organ, the first she had ever heard, and signified her appreciation of the various changes of the chords as they were successively struck. The same instrument has been tested upon various persons afflicted with deafness with invariably satisfactory results. One gentleman, deaf and dumb from childhood, although he could not understand words, informed Mr. Barrell in signs that he could hear very distinctly, and that the tones transmitted to him sounded as sharp and distinct as pistol shots, though not so loud. Another gentleman, partially deaf, who tried it, said he could hear very distinctly when the tones spoken were too low for him without the aid of the instrument. This was while walking in the open air. The dentaphone is constructed on the principle of the telephone, and consists of a circular shaped metal air-chamber, with a central bell mouth called the receiver, just inside of which is a diaphragm, connected by a silk cord with an ebony mouthpiece, adjustable to any distance from the receiver. The cord passes from the diaphragm out at the rear aperture of the air chamber. The mouth piece is taken between the teeth and the receiver placed at such a distance in the direction of the sound, as is necessary to draw the string moderately tight. The receiver then takes the sound, which is immediately intensified by the vibration of the diaphragm, conveyed along the cord to the mouthpiece and thence through the medium of the teeth to the auditory nerve. Persons with artificial teeth cannot hear so well, as the connection between the mouthpiece and the bones of the head is measurably broken. Still, it is claimed that if such teeth are firmly placed they constitute an effective conductor.

Returned Elders.—Elder William W. Turner, of the 21st Ward, arrived in good health last Thursday from his mission to Europe, having been absent from home two years and five days. His labors were confined to the Birmingham Conference, an extensive field, including Northamptonshire, Warwickshire, Herefordshire, Worcestershire, Staffordshire and Shropshire. He baptized 55 new members, re-baptized 5, blessed 17 children, and organized three new branches. He closed his work in the latter two of the above named shires, baptized 16 persons in one day, and left seven other believers for his successors to initiate into the Church. He did a great deal of out-door preaching, traveled over 8,700 miles while in England, and, as is evident from the above statistics, was richly blessed in his efforts to spread the Gospel. He is endowed with the gift of healing to a remarkable degree, and was thus enabled, through the help of the Lord, to administer much to the relief of the afflicted. He returns in good spirits, feeling greatly benefited by his missionary experience.

We had a pleasant call on Saturday from Elder W. W. Willey, of Bountiful, who returned with the company of Saints reaching this city last Thursday evening. Bro. Willey was absent from home just eighteen months and fourteen days, and spent all the time in Great Britain, laboring in the London Conference. He returns in good health and spirits.

He was standing near the fire box at the time, through which the escaping hot water and steam came gushing, and the whole of his left side and limbs were scalded. The engine was so disabled that it had to be sent after by a special locomotive from this city. Mr. Kimball was brought up on the regular evening express, and is now at his home in this city, and progressing favorably.
