GILBERT BELNAP ASSIGNS.

Total Liabilities \$7,755.77—James Harrop Appointed Assignee.

County Commissioners Meet and Vote Practically as First Announced.

District Court Notes.

Commissioner Smith reported that work on the special road map at Randolph was about completed and the work which has been done under the supervision of George J. Linford, road supervisor, was entirely satisfactory.

County surveyor furnished a statement showing distribution of line of U. S. R. Co. in Weber county as follows: Farr West, 1.10 miles; Perry, 1.71 miles; Ogden, 3.86 miles; Utah, 5.57 miles; Riverside, 3.99 miles, making a total of 16.33 miles, and clerk was authorized to furnish treasurer with certified copy of above in order that distribution may be made on assessment rolls. A petition was filed by residents of Liberty, praying for extension of road in said district.

Notice was received from Davis and Weber County Canal Co., of annual stockholders' meeting, for purpose of electing new directors, to be held Saturday, Nov. 17th, at 10 a. m. on motion of Commissioner Smith, Commissioner Adams was appointed a committee to represent Weber county at said meeting with power to act.

W. B. Wilson, superintendent county schools, furnished an estimate of amount required for payment of superintendents' salary, institute expenses, payment of county examiners and contingent expenses for school year 1900 to 1901, amount required, \$14,415, and the said amount was set aside as prayed for.

Tax matters were taken up and discussed. Resolved taken until Wednesday, Nov. 14th.

GILBERT R. BELKNAP ASSIGNS.

Yesterday Gilbert R. Belknap, the well known grocery man, assigned his business at 2411 Washington avenue, naming as the assignee James Harrop. The liabilities total \$7,755.77, most of the creditors being Ogden people, among them being The First National Bank, \$1,000; Sweeney & Sons Co., \$1,200; F. J. Kiesel & Co., \$349.91; Ogden Milling and Elevator Co., \$438.93; C. A. Smith & Co., \$307.57. The total amount of assets is \$7,515, which consists of stock, fixtures, wagons, horses and outstallion accounts. Mr. Belknap has been running his grocery business for the past two years, and it was thought on a very successful scale, and the announcement of this assignment caused a considerable surprise to the public in general.

Suit was filed today in the Second district court by Rachel Bell, as guardian of Abraham and Sarah Bell, minors, against Daniel Murdoch et al, to secure judgment in the sum of \$400 against the defendants and for foreclosure of a certain mortgage given in security for the payment of a \$400 promissory note.

The board of county commissioners, sitting as a board of canvassers, are canvassing the election returns. They have found the returns as far as they have examined the same as published in the papers a few days ago. It will take several days before the canvass is completed.

FARMINGTON.
J. D. Wood of Ogden Appointed Receiver for Stamping and Canning Co.

Farmington, Davis Co., Nov. 12.—The Ogden Savings Bank, a corporation of Ogden, Utah, has brought suit in the district court of Davis county, by its complaint filed and returned by the Stamping and Canning company, Bees Lumber company, Geo. A. Lowe company, James Pingree, trustee, John Manning, J. W. Patterson, Chas. Parker, Jas. R. Beas, Jas. Parker, Alex. Parker, Chas. Mitchell, Ole Olson, and Parley P. P. Prophet, in mortgage foreclosure proceedings as to real and personal property of the Ogden Savings Canning company. This company, by John Manning, president, and the last nine defendants above named executed notes and secured same by real and chattel mortgages to the Ogden Savings Bank, and the First National Bank of Ogden, altogether in the sum of \$37,500, and the First National Bank assigned its holdings to the Ogden Savings Bank, which bank now brings this action, for foreclosure; the complaint sets out that the plaintiff has paid an insurance on the building, and personality of the mortgage company \$900, which the mortgagees agreed to pay, but failed to do. It is alleged that of the amount of the mortgage, only the sum of \$500, has been paid thereon, and in addition the plaintiff is asked for the balance of the mortgage, the sum of \$36,500 is asked for as attorney's fees.

The complaint sets out that the property set out in the chattel mortgage, which includes all of the machinery and apparatus in both departments of the Stamping and Canning company, and all goods, the products of the factory are in danger of being lost and materially injured and that the conditions of none of the mortgages have been performed, and therefore asks for the appointment of a receiver to take charge of the premises of the Canning company and of the property thereof and preserve the same during the pendency of this action. And for the foreclosure of the same.

Upon this complaint Judge Rolapp today appointed J. D. Wood of Ogden as receiver, with bonds fixed at \$50,000. Mr. Wood later qualified and entered upon his duties as receiver. Mr. Wood's sureties are Adam Patterson, Joseph Clark, Hugh C. Wood, H. H. Spencer and James Pingree, who each qualify in the sum of \$10,000.

SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.
The timber reserves of the Queensland government now embrace 153,323 acres, and are likely to be greatly extended. While the chief foreign demand for the hard woods seems to be for parquetry, the little known timbers whose rich colors, the grain and quality of taking a high polish admirably adapt them for cabinet work. Among these attention is called to the black ironwood (Eucalyptus sp.), whose wood is of a rich dark yellow color; the Eucalyptus Australis, with a pinkish to flesh-colored wood; the black ironwood, which splits well and when split resembles ebony; and a forest oak of Laidley creek, which is very red and is given a unique appearance by its beautiful markings. Some fine wood used in a so-called case-work of the Laidley district—are being used for workmen's huts and other common purposes.

A question that seems yet unsolved is the fixing of the greatest depth at which mining is possible. The rate of temperature increase downward is very regular, and the little known geologist of Victoria points out that while the assigned rate of 1 deg. Fahr. for each 60 feet at Bendigo would give a temperature of 150 deg. at the foot of a shaft, it is actually observed, that this is not the case. It has been suggested that, if haulage could be provided, mining might be carried on at 1,000 feet. No one is reported, however, the weight of the air alone would heat the air, leaving the surface at 60 deg. up to 90 deg., and the pressure would make ventilation impracticable. It is noticed that earthworms are being gradually distributed in new places in the roots of transported plants. These worms, being very numerous in greenhouses, but two species—one from Brazil—are found to have become acclimatized in the soil of New Gardens, and a number of European worms now live in American soil.

The caves of the earth, as well as the abysses of the ocean, are beginning to give up their secrets. The efforts of the French Society of Speleology, founded about five years ago, our knowledge of subterranean regions has been greatly extended. The science of caverns forms the subject of a new book by E. A. Martel, general secretary of the society, and one of the most famous of cave explorers. The chief sources of caverns are the solution of carbonate of lime, and the action of charged water through erosion, corrosion and hydrostatic pressure. An interesting feature of caverns is found in the "stalactites," or deep pits, whose origin has been a source of much disagreement, but which in many cases seems clearly to have been outside action working downward from the surface. Some of the caverns of limestone plateaus drop vertically 200 to 600 feet, then expand into vast chambers. Many of these pits have been measured to a depth of 600 feet from the surface. A cave of 600 feet depth of all discovered by David Martin at a height of 5,000 feet in the Hautes Alpes, has been descended more than 1,000 feet vertically. Its depth being estimated to be 1,200 feet. Many caves are natural dwellings in their form, a few are still inhabited, and subterranean regions have their own fauna and flora, and a diversified stock of minerals.

Alcohol from potatoes, unlike the ordinary product, burns without leaving a sticky deposit, and is being used for lighting in France and Germany. The vegetable has given very satisfactory results to the Weidbach mantle. The jumps resembling those used for oil, burn twenty-four hours, and yield a consumption of a fifth of a pint.
