SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.

The timber reserves of the Queensland government now embrace 152,323 acres, and are likely to be greatly extended. While the chief foreign demand for the hard woods seems to be for logging, the little known timbers whose rich colors, the grain and quality of taking a high polish admirably adapt them for cabinet work. Among these attention has been called to the black birch, which affords a yellow color; the Eleocharis Australis, which has a pinkish or flesh-colored wood; the black birch, which affords a well and when it resembles ebony; and a forest oak of Laidley creek, which is very red and is being marketed as mahogany. Its beautiful markings, some of which resemble those of rose-wood of the Laidley district—are being used up for workmen's huts and other common purposes.

A question that seems yet unsolved is the fixing of the greatest depth at which mining is possible. The rate of temperature increase downward is about one degree for every 32 feet, while the assigned rate of 1 deg. Fahr. for each 60 feet at Bendigo would give a temperature of 152 deg. at the 5,000 foot level, this is not really observed. It has been even suggested that, if haulage could be provided, mining might be carried on at 10,000 feet. With 1 deg. Fahr. for every 32 feet, the weight of the air alone would heat the air, leaving the surface at 69 deg. at 10,000 feet, and the pressure would make ventilation impracticable. With the increase of rock heat of 1 deg. for every 32 feet, as actually found at Bendigo, the limit for mining might safely be placed at 4,000—or possibly 5,000 feet.

It is noticed that earthworms are being gradually distributed in new places in the roots of transported plants. Some of the species are little known insects, but two species—one from Brazil—are found to have become acclimated in the soil of New Gardens, and a number of European worms now live in American soil.

The caves of the earth, as well as the abysses of the ocean, are beginning to give up their secrets. Through the efforts of the French Society of Speleology, founded about five years ago, our knowledge of subterranean regions has been greatly extended, and the science of cave exploration has become a subject of the A. Martel, general secretary of the society, and one of the most famous of cave explorers. The chief sources of various reports on earth-cave structure and the action of acid-charged water through erosion, corrosion and hydrostatic pressure. An interesting feature of caverns is found in the 'stalactites,' or deep pits, whose origin has been a source of much disagreement, but which in many cases seems clearly to have been outside action working downward from the surface.
