

## THE DUCHESS OF MARLBOROUGH

Deed of Separation Between Her  
And the Duke Has Been  
Signed.

### INCOMPATIBILITY OF TEMPER.

she keeps Sunderland House and Her  
Dowry But May Not Go to  
Blenheim.

London, Oct. 27.—The afternoon papers here quote the Manchester Guardian as saying that a deed of separation between the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough has been signed, on the ground of incompatibility of temper, the provisions of which the duchess keeps Sunderland house, London, and her own dowry, but it precluded from going to Blenheim. The document, it is added, was signed Oct. 25. The duke is now at Blenheim and the duchess is staying at Sunderland house.

### GREAT BRITAIN, FRANCE AND ITALY FORM ALLIANCE.

New York, Oct. 27.—A London dispatch published here today claims that a defensive alliance has been made between Great Britain, France and Italy which is to become operative whenever the triple alliance between Germany, Austria and Italy is renewed. This re-grouping of the great powers, says the dispatch, is a natural outcome of the destruction of the balance of power in Europe consequent on the paralysis of Russia in the Japanese war.

### RESCUED FROM FIRE.

Eleven Persons From a Burning Hotel  
In Columbus, Ohio.

Columbus, O., Oct. 27.—Eleven persons were rescued early today from a fire in the upper rooms of the Palm hotel, on High street. The fire caught from defective wiring and cut off escape by the stairways. Firemen placed ladders and carried half suffocated men, women and children down in their night clothes. Four persons were seriously injured.

### GOLD FROM SOUTH AFRICA.

Largest Consignment Ever Shipped  
From There Received in London.  
London, Oct. 27.—The largest consignment of gold ever shipped from South Africa arrived in London today. The value was \$5,500,000.

### MOROCCAN TRIBES.

Sultan Will Try to Persuade Them  
Against a Holy War.

Paris, Oct. 27.—The French government has been advised that the Moroccan authorities, as the result of the energetic representations made by the French of Morocco City, have agreed to send a Kaid to Tafaleit, Southern Morocco, for the purpose of claiming the fanatical tribes there and persuading them to abandon their project of declaring a holy war after the Ramadan festival. No change is reported in the situation of affairs in the southern part of Morocco.

### SULTAN'S FORCES VICTORIOUS.

Mellia, Morocco, Oct. 27.—The sultan's forces have been victorious in a battle on the borders of Mellia. A strong agitation against foreigners is reported to be in progress in Morocco City.

### BURNING STEAMER ABANDONED.

Capetown, Oct. 27.—The British steamer Haverham Grange, from New York Sept. 2, was abandoned Oct. 24. The passengers and crew were all saved and were landed here by the steamer Matatu.

### AMERICAN MISSION.

Will Remain at Fez Until Sultan Acts  
On Demand for Indemnities.

Tangier, Oct. 27.—The American mission  
headed by Minister Gummere has  
decided to remain in Fez until the sultan  
takes steps on the payment of the  
indemnities demanded for outrages  
upon American citizens. The govern-  
ment declares it has not sufficient funds  
to meet these demands. It is rumored  
here that Dr. Rosen, the German minister  
of Morocco, has arranged to make  
a small loan to the sultan. Dr. Rosen  
will remain at Fez because of the dis-  
turbed state of the country.

### TO MAKE POSTAGE STAMPS.

New York, Oct. 27.—After Feb. 1 next  
the American Bank Note company will  
manufacture all United States post-  
age stamps. Under a contract made  
public yesterday the concern must de-  
liver 27,000,000 stamps daily six times a  
week.

The American Bank Note company  
made the first postage stamps for the  
government and held the contract up  
to 13 years ago. At that time the gov-  
ernment went into the business itself,  
and down to this day the bureau of  
printing and engraving has turned out  
all stamps. It is declared the govern-  
ment has decided that the work can  
be done cheaper by contract.

### MAYOR SCHMITZ

In Europe Studying How to Rebuild  
San Francisco.

New York, Oct. 27.—A Herald cable  
from London today contains an inter-  
view with Eugene Schmitz, mayor of  
San Francisco, who is at present in the  
British capital spending much of his  
time in visiting London's municipal dis-  
tricts in order to see how affairs are ad-  
ministered and the class of buildings

that is in vogue. Mr. Schmitz said  
that in re-constructing San Francisco,  
they must build for the people who will  
live there 200 years hence as well as  
today and that was the reason for his  
visit to Europe. He intended to visit  
most of the big cities on the continent,  
said, and his visits to Liverpool and  
Glasgow, already made, had been use-  
ful. He spoke of the dock system of  
Liverpool as having favorably im-  
pressed him and declared that some of  
the ideas if applied to San Francisco,  
would make that port one of the great-  
est of harbors.

Mayor Schmitz said he hoped, as the  
result of his tour, to make all the best  
points of municipal administration in  
Europe contribute to the well being  
of his people so that in a few years San  
Francisco will have arisen a finer and  
more beautiful city than ever.

CASTRO HAS RECOVERED.

New York, Oct. 27.—Information made  
public here by Charles R. Fagard,  
the Venezuelan consul general to New  
York, is to the effect that President  
Castro, who has been reported as dan-  
gerously ill, is again attending to his  
duties.

SAY ANARCHIST WAS ABDUCTED.

Cleveland, O., Oct. 27.—Friends of Al-  
exander Berkman, the anarchist who  
mysteriously disappeared here Thurs-  
day, insist that he has been abducted  
either by private detectives or secret  
service officials. Walter Behnken at  
yesterday called on Harris R. Cooley, chair-  
man of the board of public service, and  
told the latter that he had received in-  
formation which led him to believe  
that Berkman had been followed here  
by detectives and that they had pro-  
duced his secret arrest and that he was  
being held a prisoner somewhere with-  
out due process of law. Mr. Cooley  
granted Behnken permission to make a  
search of the workhouse and other in-  
stitutions here, but he was not found  
at any of these places.

FANCY PRICE FOR REALTY.

New York, Oct. 27.—Felix Isman of  
Philadelphia paid a fancy price for a  
choice piece of real estate in Manhattan  
yesterday. For the property at the  
southeast corner of Fifth avenue and  
Forty-second street, 73.3 by 106, he paid  
\$1,500,000, or at the rate of \$211 a square  
foot.

ST. PETERSBURG GARRISON.

It is Strengthened to Preserve Order  
October 30.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 27.—The garrison  
of St. Petersburg has been strength-  
ened by three regiments of infantry to  
assist in preserving order Oct. 30, the  
anniversary of the grant of the Rus-  
sian constitution, which will be cele-  
brated in St. Petersburg by official ser-  
vice of thanksgiving in the Kazan  
and St. Isaac cathedrals. Permission  
has been given to the press to de-  
corate and illuminate their houses,  
but strong orders have been issued  
against street demonstrations or meet-  
ings. The prefect of police has or-  
dered the house porters, who form an  
auxiliary police, to remain constantly  
on duty at the doors of their houses  
from Oct. 29 to Oct. 30 and assist in  
maintaining order. Demonstrative  
strikes are expected to occur in a num-  
ber of cities in the south, but these,  
like the one day strike at Kokaterino-  
slav, on which Thursday's sensational  
story of the St. Petersburg police, are  
anticipated to be merely temporary and  
no serious menace to business or traffic  
is reported.

SENSATION IN RUSSIAN COURT.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 27.—The trial of  
the members of the council of work-  
ingmen's delegates produced a mild  
sensation yesterday when the court  
refused the demand made by M. Cru-  
zab, of counsel for the defense, that  
M. Lopucsin, former director of the po-  
lice department, be subpoenaed. Grun-  
berg declared that he had a copy of a  
report made by Lopucsin to Premier  
Stolypin stating that the police de-  
partment had caused incendiary  
proclamations to be printed and  
circulated, and had organized anti-  
Jewish uprisings.

The report of Topucsin referred to  
by Grunberg is dated June 27. It  
contains a strong indictment of M.  
Catschowski, the former head of the  
political police, and makes positive  
circumstantial allegations to the effect  
that the late Gen. Trepot played the  
chief role in the organization of the  
Jewish massacres.
