nency than any others examined in Montana, for, though narrow at the surface, they have widened out and improved in appearance to an unusual degree. The Silver Shower mine has two shafts of 20 and 30 feet, the vein is three feet wide, and the average ore assays \$628 35 in silver, and \$50.25 in gold, making an aggregate of \$678.58 per ton. The ore is a liver colored iron, of bright, lively appearance, with a small proporstate, and the chlorides, 75 per cent.
