Many are to be returned to France as rapidly as the railroad can transport them. According to the treaty the Germans will hold only Belfort, Longwy and Nancy, as hostages till the fulfillment of conditions.

NEW YORK, 11.—The counsel for Foster, the street car murderer, are making desperate efforts to set the trial postponed. Judge Stuart said Judge Cordova was applied to yesterday to remove the case from the court list of to-day, but he gave a prompt refusal. The attempt of Foster's counsel to-day, will be to get the trial delayed on technical objections.

PHILADELPHIA, 11.—In the Supreme Court this morning, counsel for the St. Clements church asked the court for an injunction to restrain the vestry from dismissing the minister, stating that the application was made at the request of Judge Lehigh, of Philadelphia, who had taken cognizance of the case.

CHICAGO, 11.—Private advice, known to be reliable, state that the Mace-Coburn fight was stopped by the Canadian authorities after the men entered the ring.

MONTANA.
SALT LAKE CITY, 11.—Yesterday morning while the snow storm was being ferried across at White Tail, Deer Creek, the boat capsized. All were saved except two sacks of the mail and the treasure box. A party is searching for the lost articles. The same day, while the Diamond "R." Fast Freight team was crossing Boulder Bridge gave way, precipitating the outfit into the stream. Everything was saved except one package. Owing to the late warm weather all the streams are very high.

CALIFORNIA.
GRANDE POINTE.
SAN FRANCISCO, 11.—The Mercantile Library Association has received a large donation to the library within a few days.

The grape harvesters are destroying the crops in Los Angeles county.

SAN FRANCISCO.—It has been reported to-day along the city front, that the steamer Pacific, from Portland and Victoria, had foundered, carrying down all on board. The report, of course, produced the most painful anxiety. No such dispatches have been received from any source, and the report is, so far as can be ascertained, wholly unfounded.

The bark Chas. de la Roche, on a coasting voyage to the N. W. coast, has put into Santa Cruz looking badly, pumps choked with salt, and the crew utterly exhausted with their efforts to keep her afloat. She encountered a north-wester in full force, and has been in distress since Sunday.

Stocks are buoyant again this afternoon, and considerable excitement was manifested among curb-stone operators on the street, after the board closed.

FOREIGN NEWS.
GREAT BRITAIN.
PARIS, 11.—A Times' special dispatch says that Montenegro and Vanvree are at odds. The nationalities occupying the peninsula, have refused to sign the treaty.

The Telegraph's special dispatch says the Germans are prompted to send back quickly the French prisoners.

A loan of one million francs has been secured by the Frankfurt bankers.

FRANCE.
Rosell arrested and escapes—Fearful of being arrested.

PARIS, Wednesday evening, via London 11.—The evening papers all condemn the Commune and Central Committee for thwarting General Rosell in his plans, and recommend the confining of Rosell to prison.

The chief of the Commune is expected to be at the fortifications of Paris, after occupying Fort Issy, turned the guns against the ramparts.

PARIS, 11.—Because of his proclamation, the Commune desires that Thiers' furniture be seized and his residence demolished.

Rosell was arrested yesterday and placed in the custody of M. Girardin. At five both had disappeared and neither have yet been recaptured.

The chief of the Commune is expected to be on Antwerp and Point du Jour. Both sides are meeting.

Delandine is appointed Delegate of War.

PARIS, 11.—The cannonade continues, the results of which are described as tremendous.

Vanvree still resists.

Yesterday the government troops carried the batteries at Boulogne, and captured the crown, who led in every direction. The fight is undecided.

CANADA.

TORONTO, 11.—Fifty armed volunteers have just left Simcoe, about four miles from Fort York, for the battle ground to prevent the fight.

PORT HURON, 11.—The fight between Coburn and Mace was prevented by the Canadian authorities. The men in question entered the ring shortly after noon. During the fight, round and before a blow was struck, the sheriff and county judge, backed by a number of soldiers from Simcoe, dispersed the crowd, who fled in every direction. The fight is undecided.
