OPHIR CITY, August 1.—There was an election to-day, for District Recorder. The candidates were E. P. Martin and J. A. Brown. It was the largest vote ever polled here. There was great excitement. They not only extend to every point of importance in Great Britain and Ireland, but also include tours on the continents of Europe, Asia and Africa. We don't know but what he will extend them to Utah yet, and he would do well to come to Salt Lake and the Pacific. The railroad and steamship companies are so favorable to Mr. Cook's enterprises that he is enabled to take passengers at astonishingly low rates, and his parties are conducted with such promptness that accidents hardly ever occur to any of his companies.
