

ed Russia to send a mission to Kabul whenever she chose. He compared the new aggressive policy, of which the Ameer is the victim, with that which led to the former Afghan war. He prayed God to avert the melancholy omen, and hoped that the different Viceroy, if not different governments, would undo the present evil work. Even if the country endorsed it, it was the solemn duty of those who believed that truth and justice were the only true foundation of policy, to record their protest.

When Gladstone concluded his speech there was prolonged cheering.

After several minor party speeches, Lord George Hamilton replied to Gladstone. He urged that the frontier relations had been getting worse every year, and would have resulted in war with Russia unless the government had assumed a determined attitude. We should be in constant danger from Russia until a British resident was placed in Herat.

The debate was adjourned to Thursday.

In the House of Lords, Earl Grey reopened the debate in behalf of the opposition.

Lord Cairns replied. He defended the constitutionality of government's action, and spoke approvingly of the policy formerly advocated by Lord Lawrence that Russia should be notified that any interference with the affairs of Afghanistan would be a *casus belli*.

Lords Selborne and Ripon attacked the government.

Lord Houghton (liberal) defended the government.

Lord Beaconsfield warmly attacked the opposition's miserable criticism of details. Eight months ago, when war between England and Russia was more than probable, Russia's Asiatic preparations were admissible from her point of view, but those preparations having shown the vulnerability of the present Indian frontier, it was impossible to leave things as they formerly were. Russia, since the dissipation of her fears of war, had done everything to make honorable amends. Her conduct had been very different from the Ameer's. Her Majesty's government would have been quite content if the Ameer had admitted British residents. Lord Beaconsfield denied that he had even said the rectification of the frontier was the object of the war, but it would be the consequence thereof. He concluded with an eloquent denunciation of the peace-at-any-price policy.

After Lord Beaconsfield's speech, the House divided on Viscount Halifax' amendment censuring the government, and it was rejected by a vote of 201 to 65.

Lord Cranbrook's resolution that the expenses of the Afghan war may be defrayed from Indian revenues, was then adopted without division.

#### AN UNNECESSARY SCARE.

Editors Deseret News:

Having noticed in your last night's issue a few remarks that I thought were calculated to create needless alarm through the community, under the heading of "A Growing Sentiment," will you kindly grant me space in your valuable paper, to express a few ideas upon the same subject, viz. the prevalence of diphtheria, and the desirability if not a necessity of closing our day and Sunday schools.

According to the testimony of both ancient and modern prophets, great and terrible judgments were to be poured out upon the inhabitants of the earth in the last days, and we as Latter-day Saints, believe that we are living in this very eventful period of the world's history, our writings, and preaching at the present time confirm this. Hence the vast destruction of human life and property occasioned by cyclones, yellow fever, floods, railroad and steamboat collisions, fires, shipwrecks, grasshoppers, codling moths, etc., affording so many confirmatory evidences of the truth of these scriptures. We also believe that judgments must begin at the house of God. And he that seeketh to save his life shall lose it. I regard diphtheria, as one of the scourges indicative of the times in which we live, and that no precautionary measures can successfully stay its ravages. Neither age, sex, nor position escape. The cottages of the poor, the homes of the rich, as well as those who reside in more

favorable locations unexposed by contact and possessing the natural advantages of pure air and limpid mountain streams of water, are alike visited by this dire disease. This fact seems to indicate that its spread does not depend upon its contagious character; and I, for one, should be exceedingly sorry for such a sweeping and unnecessary alternative to be adopted as the closing of our day and Sunday schools, thus depriving our boys and girls (who are in health) of enjoying that mental and physical exercise so essential to the preservation of their well being. To be consistent, however, if schools are to be closed, all public places of worship should also be closed, every store on Main street, especially those where toys and candies are sold, for there the children will be sure to congregate during the holidays unless prevented by rigid quarantine regulations and enforced by municipal power.

I would much rather recommend to all Latter-day Saints, to humble themselves before the Lord, and acknowledge this visitation as intended for their good.

To observe the "word of wisdom" in what they eat and drink, that the destroyer may pass by their doors. Abstain from all intoxicating drink. When difficulties occur and disputes arise through misunderstanding or otherwise, do not go to law with each other, but carry out the law of the Lord, and be reconciled. When sickness overtakes you, carry out the instructions the Lord gave to his servant Joseph Smith, which may be found on the 160th page of the Doctrine and Covenants, also James 5th chapter, 14 and 15 verses. I deem it wisdom for parents whose children are sick, not only from diphtheria, but fever or any other disease, to keep them at home to receive proper care and attention until convalescent. But I have grave objections to the suggestions of such measures as will create in the public mind a false and fearful alarm, unsustained by existing facts.

Let the boys and girls, therefore, enjoy their freedom at play, at their schools, and also at gazing through the windows of the toy and candy shops on Main Street.
