ISAAC MORLEY CALLED.

Veteran of Missouri and Illinois and Utah Pioneer Closes Life's Labors.

Moroni, Sanpete Co., May, 24.—A large audience gathered in the ward taber-nacle today, to do honor to the memory of Isaac Morley, one of Moroni's pio-ner settlers, who passed away on Fri-day. May 22, of cancer. He was the last surviving son of Patriarch Isaac Morley and Lucy Gunn, born at Kirt-land, Ohio, May 2, 1829, where his fa-ther with Sidney Rigdon and many others received the gospel, in Novem-ber, 1830, through the preaching of Parley P. Pratt, and other elders. When he was two years old, his par-ents moved to Missouri where they passed through the trying scenes of Far West and Independence, subse-quently making their home at what is known as Morley's settlement, in Ill-nois, which place was sacked and burned by the mobocrats in September. 1845, the subject of this article being then 16 years of age. The family crossed the relars in 1848 reaching Sult Lake

then 16 years of age. The family crossed the plains in 1848, reaching Salt Lake City in September of that year, where they resided about one year. In the fall they resided about one year. In the fall of 1849, the family with others, were called to settle at Manti, this county, Two years later deceased became one of the pioneer settlers of Moroni, he being credited with building the first house in the new settlement. He was of a quiet, retiring disposition, indus-trious habits, a firm believer in the divinity of the great latter-day work, and an honored member of the high priests' quorum.
