

## MISCELLANEOUS.

**THE LOSS OF STEAMSHIPS.**—The first steamship that crossed the Atlantic was the *Sirius*, in 1838. The regular line of European steamships was started by Mr. Cunard in 1840, and since that time there have been lost on the stormy Atlantic eleven vessels, making an average in eighteen years of one in every eighteen months.

5. City of Philadelphia—All hands saved.
6. Franklin—All hands saved.

8. Pacific—Never heard of.
9. Lyonnais—A few only saved.
10. Tempest—Never heard of.
11. Austria—Burned—A few only saved.

The Boston Independent has a letter from one of Col. Pope's party, dated Camp Pacos, July 28. He thinks that the work at that point must be temporarily abandoned and that the next experiment will be at New Mexico. The formation of the plains about Pacos, he remarks, becomes more peculiar as the auger goes down, and more difficult to penetrate. The crumbling strata constantly caving, rendered it almost impossible to keep the bore sufficiently clear for working purposes, and the friction on the tubing was so great that, with the apparatus in use, it was almost impossible to raise or lower it another inch. It is singular that, although the depth penetrated is several hundred feet, no solid strata could be found.

2. The Postmaster General may annul the contract for repeated failures to run agreeably to contract; for violating the post office laws, or disobeying the instructions of the department; or refusing to discharge a carrier when required by the department to do so; for assigning the contract without the assent of the Postmaster General; for running an express; or for transporting persons or packages conveying mailable matter out of the mail.

3. The Postmaster General may order an increase of service on a route by allowing therefor a pro rata increase on the contract pay. He may change schedules or departures and arrivals without increase of pay, provided the running time be not abridged. He may also curtail or discontinue the service, in whole or in part, at pro rata decrease of pay, allowing one month's extra compensation on the amount dispensed with, whenever in his opinion the public interests do not require the same, or in case he desires to supersede it by a different grade of transportation.

4. Payments will be made for the service by collections from or drafts on postmasters, or otherwise, after the expiration of each quarter—say in February, May, August, and November.

5. The distances are given according to the best information; but no increased pay will be allowed should they be greater than advertised, if the points to be supplied be correctly stated.
