



Our party arrived, to-day, ten days out from Deadwood. We suf-fered greatly for lack of water along the road, there not being a drop for over seventy miles, except a few stagnant pools, far apart. The health of the party is fair. We met five Indians on the 30th, on their way in from Sitting Buil, under the guidance of Sitting Ball, a Sloux scout. They bore a white flag, and were sent on. Miners are congregating there for prospecting tours. We leave on Saturday.

The English Fleet-Important Cab not Beeting.

CHICAGO, 12. - The Tribune's London special says, the fleet at Beskia Bay will be reinforced by the Achilles, atmor clad, carrying the Achilles, armor clad, carrying sixteen guns; the Agincourt, iron sixteen guns; the Agincourt, iron clad, carrying seventeen guns; the *Ruby*, carrying twelve guns, the *Flamingo*, gunboat; the *Shannon*, armor clad, carrying nine guns, and the *Tremeraire*, carrying four twenty-five guns. With these ad-ditions the British fleet will consist of twenty-four vessels mounting 150 guns and 8,000 men. Thus the avant guard of the Russians is already but 300 miles away from the Ottoman cap-
