WILL BOOM GOOD ROADS. Illinois Central Plans to Run

Special to New Orleans. Arrangements have been made where-

by the Illinois Central Railroad company and the National Good Roads as-sociation will join hands in a scheme further to educate the farmers along the line of the Illinois Central, between New Orleans and Chicago in the building of good roads. According to the hicago Record, the scheme provides for the running of a "good-roads special" between the Louisiana metropolls and Chicago, and practical dem-onstrations by expert road-builders. 'The "special" will leave New Orleans

about the middle of this month. It will be made up of eight or nine cars, including a commissary coach and flat cars enough to carry the machinery required in the building of modern agon ways. There will be men sent out in advance who will work up mass eetings at specified points, interesting the farmers in the coming of the train and explaining the purpose of the vis-

The train will make the trip between New Orleans and Chicago in about three months, stopping at twenty or more points at each of which experroad men will build about a mile The advance agents will roadway. arrange with the farmers to have ev rything ready for the practical demonstrations when the "special" arrives. The farmers will be expected to provide the material to be used in the building
