## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Lectures on Embalming—Prof Howard S. Eekles of Philadelphia will give a series of lectures on embalming Oct. 18-22 next, in this city.

**Funeral Carriage Upset**—Building obstructions on K street, near South Temple, overthrew a carriage yesterday at a funeral, Mrs. Orem and Mrs. Slade of Third Ave., were in the carriage, the latter being cut and severely shaken up, so that she had to be helped home.

**Tries a Lower Altitude**—Colonel Alfred Kent, former Utah Department Commander of the G. A. R., has gone to Spokane to visit with his son for several days and where he thinks the lower altitude will relieve an affection of the throat from which he is suffering.

**Struck By a Car**—While crossing south street last night about 8 o'clock, Thomas Clayton, aged 72 years, was struck by Murray car No. 40 and killed. He was a lame invalid and had a badly cut upper lip. He was taken to the Groves L. D. S. hospital where his wounds were dressed.

**Bids Not Opened**—Two contractors offered bids last night at the lowest of public works on the construction of the intersections of the North Temple street aqueduct at West Temple street, First and Second West streets. The bids were not opened because a quorum was not present. Zerbe & Walker and McLean & Reed submitted the tenders. Both bids came on the same amount above two weeks ago, so price was considered excessive and the tenders were rejected.

**Glass Discharged**—E. Glaser, the special officer employed at the Saltair during the time Judge Bowman yesterday afternoon on the court-second charge against him of malice and battery. On his first offense he was fined \$10, but in the case of yesterday, in which Tom Christ, a Greek, was the complaining witness, such conflicting stories were told that the evidence was too weak for the court to discharge the defendant. Judge Bowman, however, took occasion to admonish the defendant that should he appear in court again on a similar charge there would be little leniency shown.

**Will Stop Abuse of Horses**—Secretary of State has issued a circular of health and of the state humane society, has appointed R. C. Clark of Moab local humane officer, in hopes of putting a stop to the abuse of horses on the mail and freight routes running out of Moab. The mail contracts are made so clear by the government that it is easier to clean these offices at the convenience, as they are forced to work with broken down horses and wretched equipment generally. Mr. Clark has written to the national headquarters and the president of the national body sends the following letter to Mr. McClellan:

As election draws near the "American" police department is turning its back and shutting its eyes to the gambling evil, presumably with the object in view of soothing the sporting element vote.

In addition to the slot machine now being countenanced and protected by the powers that be, now comes the gambling in the wine rooms of saloons and the backrooms of practically every cigar store in town.

There are about 250 saloons and cigar stores in Salt Lake City and it is safe to say that in 90 per cent of them games of chance are conducted without interference from the police. Most of the games are called "slough" games, but that poker and other varieties are played for money daily there is not a chance of doubt. The police know this, as they know roulette and faro are played in this city. They do not interfere with it to that he gets his "bit," not only from the game but through the profits from his stock for sale.
