## EDITORIAL NOTES.

On December 31, 1878, the distribution of the population of Egypt was as follows: Cairo, 827,462; Alexandria, 165,752; Damietta, 32,-720; Rosetta, 16,243; Suez, 11,827; Port Said, 3,854; other towns, 11,747; provinces, 3,948,542; total, 5,517,627.

The somewhat astonishing statement is made that there is less banking capital employed in New York than there was twenty-five years ago, though the amount of business done is much greater. No wonder this state of things causes prrehension.

In seeking for a substance which would destroy the microscopic animals in water without injuring it for drinking purposes, Dr. Langfeldt found that citric acid (one-half gramme to every litre of the water) killed all the living organisms, except cyclops and those with thick epidermis, within two minutes.

During the last fiscal year closing July 31st, the United States Government sold 18,000,000 acres of the public domain. It is estimated that during the same period the various States holding public lands, and the railroads, disposed of about 7,000,000 acres. The great bulk of the whole amount has been sold in moderately small tracts to actual settlers.


