

## OPENING PROVES GREAT SUCCESS

Threatening Weather Keeps Crowd Away from Saltair But Track's O. K.

### PATH IS SHORT AND STEEP.

These Features Make More Thrills and Appearance of Greater Speed Delights Fans.

Owing to the threatening weather a limited number of fans went out to Saltair to attend the official opening of the new coliseum last evening, but those who did risk being deluged were repaid for their bravery. The 10-lap track is a little beauty—that was agreed upon among spectators and riders; and in being shorter and steeper, promises to make all races thrilling affairs. The roof is not in place, but no time will be lost in installing the new saucer. Weather variations are so many and frequent in Salt Lake nowadays that nothing less than a roof makes future races anything near a certainty.

### PEARY WANTS \$25,000

### BEFORE FIRST OF JULY

Confident of his ability to plant the Stars and Stripes at the North Pole, Robert E. Peary, who has carried the American flag nearer to the pole than any explorer, is now in New York making active preparations for another Arctic dash, and expects to start on his journey, which has been overhauled and is ready to start.

Peary's present plans contemplate departure from New York about July 1, but lack of sufficient funds to finance the expedition may prevent the start. Unless \$25,000 is donated, which the project will be abandoned. A collector will accompany the Roosevelt as far north as Etah, which was the winter quarters of Dr. Hayes' last expedition. It is located near 70 degrees north latitude. A small party of craftsmen and scientists may go to Etah on the auxiliary vessel, returning with her about Sept. 1. Peary expects to stay at Etah for 15 months, but will take with him supplies for three years' stay.
