SECONDARY WORK TO BE ELIMINATED

Such is the Recommendation of A Special Committee at University.

TO RAISE STANDARD OF WORK.

In Normal Department Until it is on a Par With Other Branches of Institution's Curriculum.

An explanation for the refusal of the University of Utah faculty to entertain a petition of the senior class for separate graduating exercises, is furnished by the making public a report of a special committee, which recommends that all secondary work at the University campus be eliminated, and that after a certain date only work of a college or university grade be carried on there.

The move contemplated is the giving of a degree with the normal school work, and the raising of the standard of this work until it is on a par with that of other branches of the University's curriculum, and commences above the grade of the High School. This condition will be brought about within four years, so that to allow separate graduations now would be merely a temporary expedient, which would have to be abandoned in the near future.

REPORT WAS UNANIMOUS.

The special committee which investigated the matter was composed of William M. Stewart, principal of the normal school; Prof. Byron Cummings, professor of ancient languages and literature; Prof. George Q. Coray, professor of economics; and Dr. J. P. Merrill, director of the school of mines. They started to work over a month ago, and their report, which is just prepared, finds unanimously in favor of doing away with the secondary school work. This move, it is held, was impracticable, until the high school system of the state was more thoroughly established, and the elimination of high schools within the past few years has made the time opportune to work for the change.

The report provides for the establishment of a secondary training school in connection with the primary one now established, and teachers will be required to take out a degree along with the professional work, if they are to be graduated. Every student who registers will be of the college grade.

WILL BEGIN NEXT YEAR.

In arranging dates when the new methods shall become effective, it was recommended that no second year preparatory students be received next year, and that the first year of the normal school be eliminated. That will bring an end to preparatory work in two years and to normal work below the college grade, in three years.

If the report is adopted, the work of eliminating the younger students will expand into a technical institution, giving work such as is now had at Chicago and Columbia. It will place the Normal department of the University at the head of western effort in that direction, and make it more thorough than that given anywhere else in the intermediate section.

1772—George Washington born in Westmoreland county, Va. died at Mount Vernon, Dec. 14, 1799.

1778—Among American painters, born in Bucks county, Pa. died in 1845.

1837—Battle of Buena Vista, Mexico, and defeat of Santa Anna's Mexican army by American volunteers under General Zachary Taylor. The watchword of the Americans was "The memory of Washington."

1848—Prisoning in Paris; beginning of the revolution against Louis Philippe. The national guard declared in favor of reform and united with the people in demanding the dismissal of the ministers. Barricades were erected on the principal streets, troops and citizens fraternized, and by night the city was in control of the mob.

1896—Edgar Wilson Nye, the popular American humorist, died near Asheville, N. C., born 1831.

1894—Lester Stephen, noted man of letters, died in London, born 1812.
